ARE THERE TOO MANY MEDICAL SCHOOLS AND DOCTORS?

The Carnegie Foundation, as it is called, has been in some sort investigating the medical schools and colleges of the United States and Canada and has made a report thereon which is also being sharply criticized. The general purport of this report is that there are far too many of these medical schools—157 where 30 would be enough—and that of the 157, among which there are a number of a very high class, the majority are poorly equipped and far from what they ought to be.

The result, as pointed out in the report, is that many unlearned and useless doctors are being turned loose in the community, where the number of so-called doctors is far in excess of the public need, while three times as many new doctors are being turned out from year to year as can possibly find honest and useful employment. These facts and instances cited are mainly from the United States, and we are left to infer that Canada is not so badly off as her neighbor to the south in that regard.

Assuming that one doctor is enough to minister to the medical needs of a thousand people, and this seems reasonable enough, the report goes on to cite different states that have each one medical man to each five hundred, six hundred or seven hundred people, while small towns are named with three hundred to five or six hundred people in which from three to five or more doctors are quartered.

HEAVING COALS OF FIRE ON THEIR HEADS.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who was in Winnipeg the day after the Conservative triumph in the Provincial elections, signalled the occasion by promising a federal grant of two and a half million dollars for a World's Fair in the prairie metropolis in 1914.

These are big figures, but we are building Transcontinentals and are going to build a navy these days, whether we build tunnels or not. And there will be a general election before 1914, which fact to some Conservative minds might raise a doubt as to who would have the money to bestow in four years hence.

But it is not these aspects of the case that we wish now to direct attention to. The outstanding fact is that Sir Wilfrid meets the rejection of his party by the electors of Manitoba in the most cheerful and kindly spirit, returning good for evil, so to speak, and in this beneficent fashion heaps coals of fire upon the heads of his political foes.

FOR A LOWER TARIFF.

As we understand the Toronto News, now one of the principal exponents of the Federal Opposition, it suggests to Mr. Borden the propriety of leading his party to the advocacy of tariff reduction. The Canadian tariff has been and is now so high that a reduction would be vastly more popular among the great mass of the consuming public than would an increase. It would be madness for the Conservative party to advocate a further increase.

The "infant" and straggling days of Canadian industries are now passing, and the high tariff which fostered them into such rapid growth is no longer necessary to their stability or prosperity. Sir John Macdonald did not contemplate a permanent high tariff when he introduced the National Policy. In Mr. Foster's days as Finance Minister he made important reductions. Therefore we would be glad to see Mr. Borden adopt the News' suggestion and strike out for tariff reform in Canada. We would get it then and before long, from one party or the other. But we shrewdly suspect that if Mr. Borden should announce a new departure along those lines, Mr. Fielding might cut under. In any case the consumer would get the benefit.

Warburton, Prowse and Richards in a most strenuous effort, even to the extent of an ultimatum, if they will prepare one, to have this matter righted. With the entire Province behind them something should be accomplished.
