Liners Stopped In Mid-Ocean (Canadian Press.) QUEBEC, June 30.—A slight diversion from the direct course of the Canadian Pacific steamer Empress of Scotland which arrived at nine o'clock this morning and a ten minute stop in mid-ocean was the result of a hurried consultation between the captain and the ship's surgeon following the picking up of a wireless message from the steamer Digby stating she had a case of diphtheria on board and anti-toxin was urgently required. The message was received at noon on the 24th instant and the 135 miles which separated the pick-up was covered by the Empress at four o'clock in the afternoon. The medicine was sent to the Digby and both vessels continued on their courses after exchanging greetings, just ten minutes after.
