

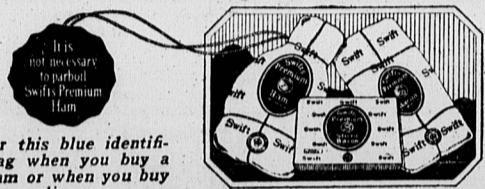

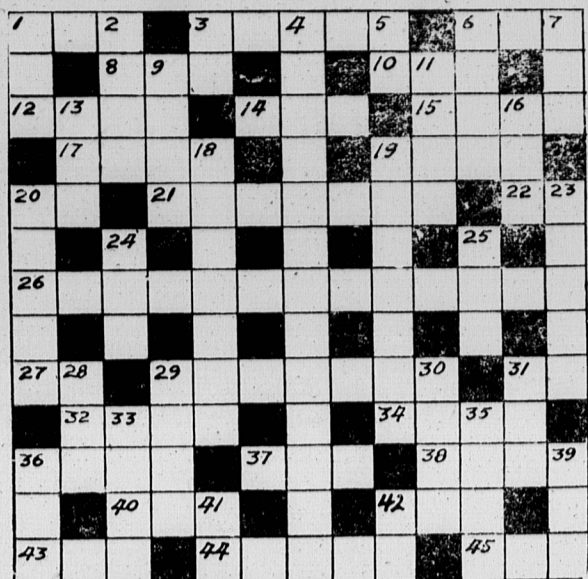

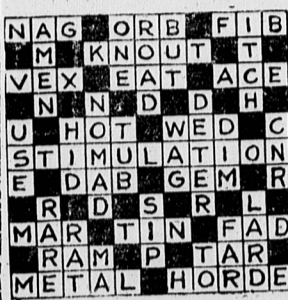

Event As It Occurs by Radio Telephony. NEW YORK, March 30.—John H. Morcraft, professor of electrical engineering at Columbia University, who addressed the Institute of Arts and Sciences tonight on recent developments of radio telephony, predicted that in a short time it will be possible by means of radio to present a picture of an event in a distant place at the same time it is occurring. "At present," he declared, "radio photographs are transmitted by means of impulses which are recorded by a delicate needle attached to a receiver. By the substitution of a spot of light in place of the needle it will be possible to transmit pictures of events as they occur."

Former President Poincare Aroused

BAR LE DUC, France, March 30.—If the Allies want to save Europe from a future as tragic as her past they must prevent any tampering with the Versailles Treaty, Raymond Poincare, former President and Premier, said in a speech here Sunday.

"So long as Germany is armed, why ask France to abandon or to decrease her means of protection?" Poincare asked, "or even to change them for uncertain guarantees or illusions of security."

"Germany says she is ready to sign another engagement not to attack us. This signature would add nothing to the Versailles Treaty but there is a danger that it may mean the rejection of other terms."
