TWENTY-SEVEN M.P.'S SERVED IN WAR

OTTAWA, April 22.—According to a return tabled in the Commons 27 men of parliament are either serving now or have served with the expeditionary forces in the present war. Twenty-two of them, including Lieut.-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes, are put down as having served overseas, and thirteen of the 27 have returned to Canada. One member, Lieut.-Col. G. H. Baker fell in action. Eight members of parliament, not counting, Hon. Dr. Beland, are still overseas. According to the return, 25 of the members are put down as not accepting either pay or separation allowance. STRIKE OF WORKERS CONTINUES EVERYWHERE IN BERLIN

Accompanying Hon. James A. Balfour on his diplomatic mission to Washington are a number of distinguished gentlemen. Among them are the following: Gen. Sir James Eric Drummond, is his presumptive to the Earl of Perth. He entered the foreign office in 1900 and was one of the Premier's private secretaries from 1912 to 1915. Ian Zachary Malcolm, M. P., was born at Quebec in 1868. He has been attached to a number of Continental embassies, including those at Berlin, Paris and Petrograd. From the outbreak of the war until 1916 he was British Red Cross officer in France, Switzerland and Russia. Rear Admiral Sir Dunderly R. W. C. Chair has been naval adviser to the Foreign Office since 1916. He was naval attaché to the United States of America in 1902, and became assistant controller of the Navy in 1910 to 1912, naval secretary to the First Lord of the Admiralty in 1912 to 1914 and commanded the Tenth cruiser squadron from 1914 to 1916. Fleet Paymaster V. A. Lawford, D. S. O., is secretary to the naval adviser, foreign office. He has had a wide experience with the British fleet in all quarters of the globe and was awarded the D. S. O. for his services in patrol cruisers. Major-Gen. G. T. M. Bridges, C. M. G., D. S. O., has been military attaché at The Hague, Brussels, Copenhagen and Christiania. During the South African war, he was in command of the West Australian Mounted Infantry. In the first year of the present war he was wounded and mentioned five times in despatches. Latterly he has headed the military mission with the Belgian Field Army. Capt. H. H. Spender-Clay, M. P., has been Unionist member for the Tonbridge division of Kent since 1910. Baron Cunliffe, governor of the Bank of England and Lieutenant of the City of London. For his services, presumably in connection with Russian finances at the beginning of the war, he was awarded the 1st Class Order of St. Anne of Russia in 1915. He was ennobled in 1914.

3,000 PRO-HUNS WATCHED IN U.S.

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Approximately 3,000 German residents of the United States are under close surveillance, Department of Justice officials announced today, because of their activities in behalf of the German Government before America's entry into the war or because of their pro-German sympathies. The department's field force of investigators now grown to formidable proportions is keeping so close a watch on the small army of suspects that it would be possible, it is authoritatively stated, to arrest virtually every man under suspicion within 24 hours. The suspects are located in every state of the union. To meet the demands of the unceasing watch upon these individuals, the department's bureau of investigation has been greatly enlarged since the beginning of hostilities with Germany and recruits are added daily to the staff. Most of the suspects had been under surveillance prior to the entrance of this country into the war, but hundreds of names have been added to the list as the grist of the great mill of auxiliary workers have been enlisted by the bureau.

MORE IDLE BOASTS OF HUN NEWSPAPERS

PETROGRAD, April 22, via London.—German preparations to attack the northern front, supported by a German fleet, reports of which appear to be well founded, bear out the war office warning, recently issued, that the enemy is preparing to march on Petrograd. The preparations consist of the massing of troops on the Dvinsk-Riga front and the concentration of transports, warships and shallow draft ships in Baltic Sea ports. A portion of the German fleet is reported to have moved from Kiel to Libau. It is regarded here as extremely probable that the plan is to cut off Petrograd from the active army. The German efforts to spread discontent in the Russian army have developed an ingenious device of loading shells with copies of Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg's Reichstag speech of March 20, and firing them into the Russian lines. London, April 19.—Reuter's Petrograd correspondent says the information concerning the preparations being made by the Germans for an attack on the Russian northern front was made public by the Russian general staff. GERMAN MORALE FALLS WITH CUT IN SOLDIERS' RATIONS

LONDON, April 21.—One of the correspondents at British headquarters in France, in a despatch dated Friday says: The cardinal fact of the battle in France is, that the intense concentration of German troops exceeds anything known during the war.
