The farmers in different parts of the Province have remarked on the white frost which made its appearance for the first time this season on Monday night last. So far little damage has been reported.

The donors of prizes and the officials in connection with the recent Guardian Bicycle Road Race are invited to be present on the band stand tonight when the prizes are presented to the winners at 8.30 o'clock.

The postponed Tennis Tournament of Ladies Singles for the Sir Louis Davies Cup will be played this afternoon commencing at 2.30 o'clock. If the weather is not fine the tournament will take place tomorrow afternoon.

There were 100 excursionists and eighteen regular passengers to Orwell by the S. S. City of London yesterday afternoon. The return cargo consisted of twenty-five cases eggs, twenty-five bags new potatoes and five tubs butter for the Sydney market.

The marriage takes place at 6.45 this morning in St. Peter's Church of Miss Marian G. Cotton daughter of W. L. Cotton Editor of The Examiner to Edgar McNutt son of F. L. McNutt of this City. Rev. James Simpson will be the officiating clergyman.

In the matter of the charge against Chester Martin, accused of forging the name of G. D. Longworth Co. to a cheque, His Honor Stipendiary Macdonald after a careful consideration of the evidence dismissed the accused. His Honor delivered a lengthy judgment. A. J. B. Mellish appeared for Maria.

It is reported the grain crops in the vicinity of Eldon are excellent, but owing to the long continued dark and wet weather the harvest is much later than usual. In the absence of the esteemed pastor, Rev. S. D. McPhee, the Rev. Mr. McLellan of Caledonia occupied the pulpit of Belfast Church on Sunday last, and preached an eloquent sermon that was much appreciated. A pleasing feature of the service was a solo by Miss Munn of New Westminster, B. C. who is at present visiting her aunt Mrs. M. G. Anderson of Kinloch. The many friends of Mrs. J. St. C. Moore will be pained to hear of her continued illness. The popular and energetic Road Inspector, A. G. Smith, appears to be getting in some good work in the way of road-making and street macadamizing.

On Saturday, Aug. 21, at an outing held at Staten Island, N. Y. the Westinghouse employees to the number of 610 were assembled, and "sleights of art and feats of strength went round." Quite a number of athletic events were pulled off. The contestants were principally College men and many of them in very good form. The programme led off with a high kicking contest and was easily won by Dennis Comeau, formerly of South Mailand, N. S. Not wishing to pluck, as it were, a single leaf from the laurels of the victor—but he was peculiarly endowed by nature for such a contest, standing as he does six feet seven and one-quarter inches in his stocking feet. With the least possible exertion, he placed his foot far above the reach of any of the shorter statured contestants; highest kick, 8 feet four inches. A hotly contested event was the quarter mile run, won by A. Gulliver O'Donnell, Hants Co., N. S. with Joseph Comeau a close second. These men had gone through some hard grilling on the cinder path, and the honor was justly deserved. The third event was a broad jump and was won by James Kennedy, of Souris, P. E. Island, distance, 21 feet 6 inches. The heavy hammer was won by another man from the Island Province, James E. Ranaghan, of Emerald, distance 138 feet 2 inches. The third Islander to win was in the one hundred yard dash T. Lewin, who was formerly of St. Dunstan's College, Charlottetown, first, and G. Abbott, of Yarmouth, a close second; time 11 seconds flat. The high jump was won by yet another Canadian, A. J. McPhee, of Sydney, C. B.; he cleared the bar at the magnificent height of five feet, nine and one-half inches. Every event that Canadians were entered in they made an excellent showing. These were not by any means easy events; in almost every line up were men, who had at former times taken prizes on fields of greater prominence. Representatives of some of the greater Colleges were there, in an unofficial character to be sure, but nevertheless in very good form.
