Scottish Union Winner Of Historic St. Leger Stakes

DONCASTER, Sept. 7.—Scottish Union, sturdy son of Cameronian, today ran back to his Derry form to capture the 163rd St. Leger Stakes. His neck victory over Challenge in a tiring run down the stretch gave his millionaire owner, Mr. Frank V. Rank, his first triumph in the St. Leger and the major share of a \$50,000 prize.

Scottish Union was second in the Derby last June to Bois Rouge, the favorite, H. E. Morris' Pasch, who finished four lengths behind. Pasch, also third in the Derby but the winner of the Two Thousand Guineas and successful in other important races this year, failed to stay on the drive to the finishing wire, as many critics had predicted. He started at 6 to 5 and Challenge at 10 to 8.

Sir Abe Bailey's Ramtapa, co-second choice with Scottish Union, since again showed he is a "morning glory"—unwilling to do on a race course what he does in training gallops—and he finished far back.

At the race Mr. Rank said he was not a betting man and had only a small wager on his colt whose sire, Cameronian, won the 1931 St. Leger. Gordon Richards, champion jockey of England, said Pasch was not suited to the "very bad pace at which he went. The rider had nothing else to say to explain his third place.

Next important items on the season's racing calendar are the big autumn handicaps, including the Cambridgeshire, the Cesarewitch and the Manchester November Handicap.
