ON QUACKS

A "quack" is defined as a "pretender," or a "charlatan," and the term is often associated with medicine. For instance we have heard quick advertisements of medicines, or quack medicines which are imposed upon the public—telling of cures for all ailments—that may attack the human body. However, the term is capable of a wider application, and quite legitimately, for the practice is all too common.

Bacon treats of the matter in his essays on subjects like "Simulation" and "Disimulation" and "On Seeming Wise." On the former he has this to say: "There are three degrees of this kind of simulation. The first, is a mere reservation and secrecy, when a man leaveth himself without observation, or without heed to be taken for what he is. The second, is a more open and expressive feigns and pretends to be that he is not." Then in the latter essay he affirms, "some are so close and reserved that they will not show their own industry, but will let some help themselves with countenance and gesture, and are wise by signs, as Cicero said of a certain man, that when he answered him he fetched on the eyebrows up to his forehead, and bent the other down to his shin."

Jan. If pressure is high they are encouraged; if normal, they are encouraged. What they fail to recognize is that an emotional upset, a heavy meal or alcohol can send up the blood pressure temporarily. If all physicians would stop telling patients how high their blood pressure is, and if all patients would stop asking their blood pressure would have its true relation, ship in estimating the actual health of the patient.

There are some points about high blood pressure that should be recognized: First, blood pressure is affected by emotional disturbances, such as losing the temper, eating and drinking too much, not getting enough rest and relaxation, keeping the mind and body tensed. Over-exertion, when tired or immediately after eating, is dangerous to one with high blood pressure.

Living on a lower level mentally and physically will prolong life, even where blood pressure is high due to hardening of the arteries.
