#### Can. Brotherhood of Railway Employees Are Expelled

WINNIPEG, Aug. 25.—By a vote of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, the Canadian Brotherhood of Railway Employees today was expelled from Congress, and its charter revoked. An open vote was taken in the convention by roll call, and after the debate which was continued during two sessions it stood 394 for revocation of the brotherhood's charter, and 151 for continuing the organization in its membership. The vote removes from affiliation with congress between 7,000 and 10,000 members scattered across the whole country, for the reason that their organization covers ground occupied by the International Body of Brotherhood Railway, Steamship Clerks, Freight Handlers, etc.

#### THE DIVINING ROD

The idea of the divining rod or some other instrument that may be used as a means of finding buried treasure, mineral deposits and underground oil or water is a superstition that continues with marvelous persistence in spite of the lack of tangible results from its employment.

It may be said without qualification or exception that no rod or instrument has yet been devised to find buried treasures, nor any instrument that will indicate the presence of gold, silver, copper, lead, zinc or other non-magnetic metals or their ores that are hidden from view underground.

Iron, nickel and some minerals that contain these metals. Such an instrument can be purchased, but special training is required to enable any one to use it successfully. A volume published by the United States Geological Survey of the Department of the Interior, entitled "Mineral Resources," contains a discussion of methods of prospecting for iron ore by magnetic surveys and by drills. Although the use of the dip needle is theoretically simple, such practice is required to make accurate observations with it and after these are made they must be interpreted by the consideration of many factors so that the unskilled user is likely to be disappointed in the results.

Gold, silver, copper, lead and zinc are not magnetic, and no instrument now in use will indicate the presence of these metals or their ores if they are hidden from view within the ground. Devices that are supposed to indicate the presence of concealed non-magnetic ores are usually offered for sale either through ignorance of with intent to defraud. Some honest attempts have been made to prospect for non-magnetic ores by measuring in different directions the capacity of the ground to conduct an electric current, the idea being that ground containing metallic material will conduct the current better than that which contains non-magnetic materials.

These attempts, as well as trials with other electric devices, however, have not been successful, and the various forms of such apparatus could not be used by one unfamiliar with electrical work.

No instrument other than the drill has been devised that will indicate the presence of water or oil underground. In determining the probable existence of underground supplies of these liquids, geologists are guided by their knowledge of the relation of beds of rocks visible at the surface to beds that contain oil or water at other places in the same general region.

vigorously culled from the flock all birds that show any physical defects such as crooked beaks, backs or breasts, excessively long toe nails, sunken eyes and long "crow" head, knock-knees or other sign of poor stamina and low vitality.

At this season, if they have not already been discarded, the heads over two years old, unless possessing the characters of extra high production and retained as breeders on this account, should be marketed as soon as they stop laying, show signs of broodiness or moult.

When trap nests are used, this condition is readily noticeable but if not the hens that have stopped laying can be easily distinguished by their shrinking comb and fading colour of face and wattles; also by the contraction of the pelvic bones.

These bones, slightly protruding on each side of the vent, remain spread to the width of about three fingers placed perpendicularly between them, as long as the hen is laying. In the poor producer they will be found closed to the width of only one finger and when the latter condition is evident early in the season, when she should be still producing, it is a fairly good indicator that the bird has given up too soon and is not the type that makes the high record.

Vigour, health and high producing qualities are shown by distinctly visible characters and all birds that do not carry these qualities in a marked degree should disappear from the flock.
