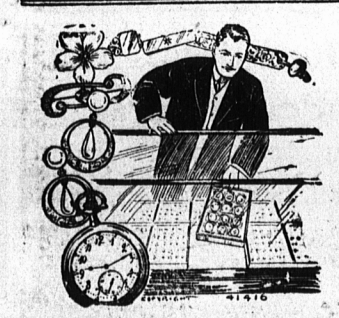

OPEN NAVIGATION.—It is worth remembering that the Steam Navigation Company's steamers stayed on the Charlottetown-Pictou route till the 22nd January, 1889. It is expected that they will do the same this year.

SERVICES.—Rev. J. S. Mackay will conduct services on Sabbath the 26th, at Pictou at 11; at Hampton at 3 and Bonshaw at 7, and on Tuesday, the 28th, at the school-house at Westmoreland at 7.30.

RAILWAY CARRIAGE BURNED.—An extraordinary outbreak of fire occurred on the Tignish night express on Monday, resulting in the total destruction of a first-class carriage. To the 8.40 express from Summerside to Tignish was attached an extra first-class carriage to be used on the return journey yesterday. It was unoccupied, and when the Conductor visited it about 9.30 p.m., West of Summerside, he found it in flames. Attempts were made in vain to subdue the conflagration, and ultimately it was decided to disconnect the carriage at Port Hill Station, which was done. The fire had secured such a hold that it was impossible to extinguish it, and the carriage was burned to the wheels. It was an old carriage which had been in use some twenty-seven years, and originally cost over \$4,000. The cause of the fire is unknown, but it is supposed to have originated with the stove.

BULGARIANS SEIZED AMERICAN RED CROSS STORES AND WORKERS AND THEN TORE DOWN THE UNITED STATES FLAG

SALONIKI, Dec. 20.—Bulgarian troops have seized the American Red Cross stores at Monastir, after tearing down the American flag, according to advices received here to-day.

Mrs. Walter Farwell, Chicago, society woman, who was in Monastir doing newspaper work, and Dr Forbes, of the Red Cross, have been taken into custody by Bulgarian officers, the despatches stated.

American Consul Kehl, of Saloniki, is preparing to appeal to Washington on behalf of the two Americans.

ITALY TO ADD MIL-LION TO ITS FORCES.

ROME, Dec. 21.—Italy has 2,000,000 men in the war, and is preparing to add another million. About a million men are on the fighting line, stretched along the mountains from Trentino to the Austrian stronghold of Gorizia.

WINTER FEEDING OF LAMBS.

A good ration consists of clover or alfalfa hay, two pounds; roots, two pounds, and corn ensilage, two pounds. Should all of the above roughage not be available, a limited amount of grain mixture composed of equal parts of oats and bran should be added to keep the lambs growing steadily and in fair flesh. Lambs made over fat during the first winter will not attain the size necessary for the breeding of large market lambs.
