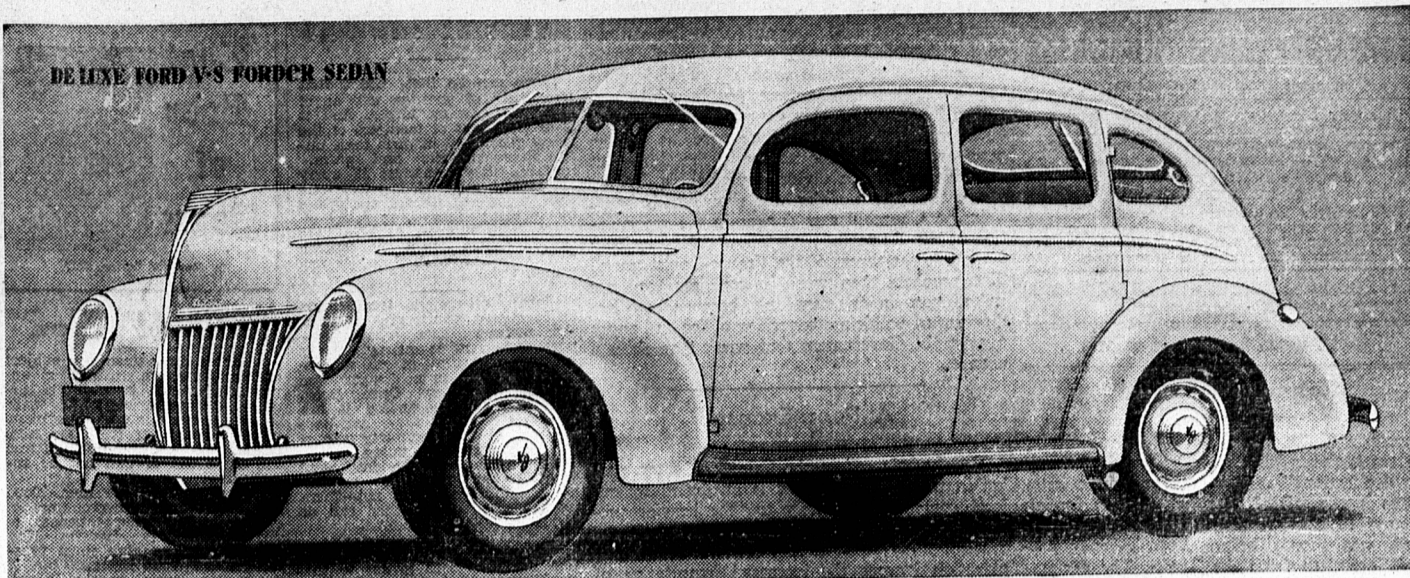

NEWS FROM QUEEN'S.—In Queen's Directory just published appear the names of the following Prince Edward Island students: Medicine '41 C. P. Hyndman, Charlottetown; P. H. MacInnis, Souris; '39 W. K. McDonald, Charlottetown; H. V. Hughes, Emerald; J. P. MacAbie, Charlottetown. Science '42 L. Keenan, Murray River; '41 A. B. Cosh, Charlottetown; W. Martin, Montague; Arts '40 P. E. Colwell, Charlottetown; A. MacDonald, North Bedeque; '39 J. R. Leard, Souris. The total enrollment for the 1938-39 session is 1,841, an increase of 45 over last year. The registration according to faculties is: Medicine 282, Applied Science 645, Arts 917. The Faculty of Applied Science is divided into different sections including: Mechanical, Mining, Metallurgy, Chemical, Electrical, Geology, Physics, Chemistry and Civil. At Queen's Fall Convocation which was held on October 29th, the Provincial Scholarships were formally awarded. Such scholarships are awarded on the basis of scholastic attainment and vary in value from \$675 to \$920 depending on the faculty in which the winner enrolls. No award was made to Prince Edward Island this year.

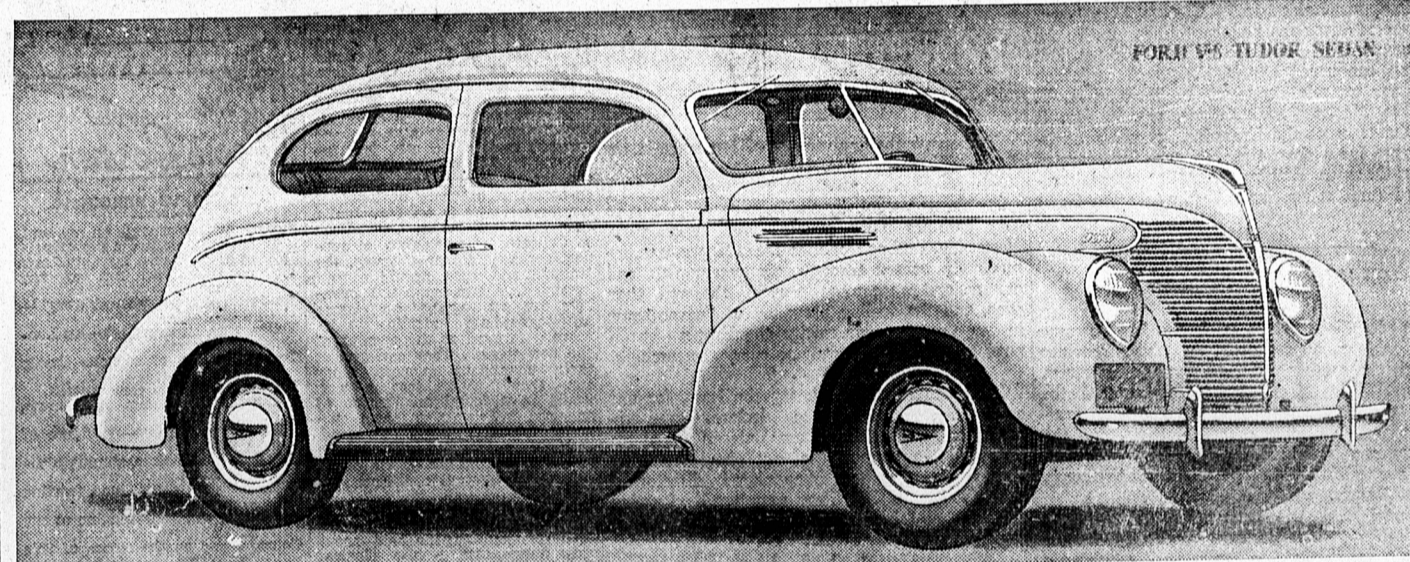

The second church was located at the corner of Prince and Richmond Streets,

where the present Heartz Memorial Hall stands. It was necessary to enlarge it several times to accommodate the increasing membership. The corner stone of the present church was laid May 23, 1863 by Lady Dundas, wife of the Lieutenant Governor of the Colony. On the 13th day of November, the completed church was dedicated to the worship of Almighty God. The services extended over to the following Sunday. The first Sunday, Rev. Dr. Richey preached in the forenoon. Rev. Henry Pope in the afternoon and Rev. Charles Stewart in the evening. On the second day, Rev. Thomas Duncan, St. James Presbyterian Church, preached in the morning and Rev. Richard Smith in the evening. In 1817, the Rev. James Hicks organized the first Sunday School of any denomination on the Island. In 1824, an Auxiliary of the Wesleyan Missionary Society was organized. Both these societies have continued to the present. In 1925, the congregation entered the United Church of Canada and became Trinity United Church. During its long history the church has had as its Ministers many outstanding clergymen and its members have taken prominent positions in Church and

State. At present Trinity Church, in number of families, is the largest in Eastern Canada. Over 100 new members were added the present year. Its work was greatly facilitated by the erection of Heartz Memorial Hall in addition to the regular work, the Church conducts the Charlottetown School of Music, directed by Prof. A. Roy Kendall, L. R. A. M., A. A. G. O., and the Charlottetown Kindergarten by Miss Berna Huestis. The Guest Preacher, Sunday, will be Rev. F. M. Young, M.A., B. D. Tryon, who has been well received in some of our largest churches. The musical part of the worship will be led by the choir, who will contribute both old and new selections. A cordial invitation is given the public and all former members and friends of Trinity to worship at these services on Sunday.
