Prague "Blacked Out" Against Air Raid

Republic Ready For Emergency

(By ALVIN J. STEINHOFF Associated Press Foreign Staff) PRAGUE, Sept. 25 (AP)—Czechoslovakia's capital tonight was the darkest in Europe—blacked out against any foreign air raid.

Street cars circled along with a faint blue glimmer replacing the usual headlights. Within dozens of the capital's old houses there was no light at all. Blue lanterns stood at some downtown street corners.

Britons Flock To Depots To Be Fitted For Gas Masks; Demonstrations Are Staged

Rhoades, Canadian Press Staff Writer) LONDON, Sept. 25—Europe's bustling war atmosphere sent thousands of Britons hurrying to Air Raid Protection depots today to be fitted with gas masks while other thousands demonstrated in the streets against Chancellor Hitler, against war and against Prime Minister Chamberlain.

The Labor Party held numerous meetings urging a firm stand in defence of Czechoslovakia. The Independent Labor Party issued a declaration saying war under any pretext would be likely to help European capitalism at the worker's expense.

As defence measures were speeded up, sound trucks rolled through the streets blaring announcements urging the people to go immediately to A. R. P. depots for the fitting of what are officially described as "civilian respirators." Black and white posters urging the same thing were placed on buildings and billboards throughout London.

HITLER WILL SPEAK TODAY; NATION TENSE

German Troops Mass On Frontier Awaiting Answer To "Final" Demands.

(By Edwin Shanko) (Associated Press Foreign Staff) BERLIN, Sept. 25—German troops pressed toward the Czechoslovak frontier all day today as preparations in case Czechoslovakia turns down Chancellor Hitler's "final" demands for a slice of the republic's territory by Oct. 1.

On every side the question was what would be Czechoslovakia's answer to the memorandum, outlining his demands, which Hitler handed Prime Minister Neville Chamberlain at Godesberg Friday for forwarding to Prague.

FRANCE SAYS NAZI TERMS UNACCEPTABLE

Exact Methods France Will Adopt If Czechoslovakia Invaded Uncertain.

(By Henry C. Cassidy, Associated Press Foreign Staff) PARIS, Sept. 25—The French Cabinet agreed unanimously today that Reichsleiter Hitler's memorandum to Czechoslovakia demanding quick occupation of Sudetenland by Germany without guarantees for new Czechoslovak frontiers was "unacceptable."

These points were: 1. Cession to Germany of a section of Sudetenland where German Germans hold a strong majority; 2. Disposition of areas with mixed populations by an international commission; 3. Guarantees by Britain, France, Germany and other neighboring powers of the new frontiers of Czechoslovakia.

LONDON, Sept. 26—(Monday)—(AP)—An official announcement was made at the French Embassy today that General Maurice Gustave Gamelin, chief of the general staff of the French defence forces, would join Premier Daladier in London today.

LONDON, Sept. 25—(AP)—An unimpeachable source said tonight that Czechoslovakia had rejected Chancellor Hitler's "final" terms for handing over Sudetenland by Oct. 1.

The Prague government, this authoritative source said, saw the German Fuehrer's demands as calculated to cripple Czechoslovakia economically, financially and industrially and leave her defenceless, crushed as an independent state.

TEXT OF CHANCELLOR HITLER'S MEMORANDUM

LONDON, Sept. 25—(CP-Havas)—Following is the text of Chancellor Hitler's memorandum handed to Prime Minister Chamberlain at Godesberg for transmission to the Czechoslovak Government, as disclosed by authoritative sources in London:—
