## THE STRIKE SITUATION SERIOUS TROOPS ARE ALL IN READINESS

### Orders Received in Montreal, Toronto and Fredericton to Have Detachments Prepared—A Incendiary Does Dastardly Work.

THE AIR FULL OF STRIKES.

MONTREAL, May 5.—(Special)—The air full of strikes today.

The baggage expressmen and the millmen have struck.

The situation along the harbor front is practically unchanged.

MORE TROOPS IN READINESS.

FREDERICTON, May 5.—(Special)—Commandant of the Military School here has received orders to hold a contingent in readiness to proceed to the city of Montreal if the strike situation requires more troops. The contingent is ready to be sent at the shortest notice.

OTTAWA, May 5.—The Minister of Militia has ordered a detachment of eighty men from the military department at St. John's Que, to go to Montreal and relieve

the Militia which has now been on duty eight days in connection with the strike of long shoremen.

TORONTO, May 5.—Col. Otter, D.O.C. received notices from Ottawa last night to hold 500 men of the Royal Canadian dragoons in readiness to proceed to Montreal, presumably in connection with the long-shoremen strike.

INCENDIARY AT WORK.

KENTVILLE, N. S. May 5.—(Special)—The large barn of Charles H. Eaton of Canard was burned with all the contents also thirty-six head of cattle. Eaton is the magistrate before whom the recent Scott Act cases were tried and the fire is believed to be the work of an incendiary.

No effort will be spared by the authorities to discover the perpetrator of the dastardly deed.

## AN ISLAND MAN SHOT IN LONDON

### Angus B. McLeod, B. A., Springton, P. E. Island Fired at.—The Bullet Enters Under the Right Ear and Passes Back Towards Neck.

LONDON, Eng. May 4.—Angus B. McLeod, a divinity student, and his brother, John McLeod both graduates of McGill University and residents of Montreal, while returning from St. Paul's Cathedral yesterday afternoon passed a group of "Hooligans" on the Gray's Inn road. One of the latter fired a revolver, the bullet hitting Angus McLeod under the right ear and passing back toward the neck. It has not yet been located. He was helped by his brother and a policeman to the Royal Free Hospital, which is on the Gray's Inn road near by. He was put in bed immediately and attended by a doctor. The police chased the Hooligans and captured two girls and two youths, all children of students, but there is no certainty that any one of the four is the miscreant.

I have just come from a visit to MacLeod at the hospital. He says, he is in no pain and comfortable. He stated that he was walking along and chatting with his brother when he saw a group of urchins. They paid no attention to them. Suddenly he heard a report and immediately felt the bullet enter his head and blood trickling down his neck. He staggered but was able to walk with assistance the short distance to the hospital. Dozens of people were around at the time, and the police man was not over thirty yards distant. He gave chase to the gang. I interviewed the house surgeon. He said he anticipated no serious results and hoped to extract the bullet in a day or two. In the meantime, he advised the patient to remain perfectly quiet and avoid developments. When he learned that MacLeod was a Canadian he promised to give him the best personal attention.

The two brothers arrived in London on Tuesday last from Montreal. They are strangers here and without friends in London. They expressed gratitude that an accurate and reassuring cable would be sent to Montreal to allay the anxiety of their friends in that city.

Gray's Inn road derives its name from Gray's Inn and Holborn, and is one of the main historic thoroughfares in London. The rookeries remaining on the back road are the resorts of Hooligans. One of these was a favorite haunt of Jack Sheppard. Crimes and deeds of violence are becoming very common in the district.

The magistrate today remanded the four prisoners and expressed his regret that the accident should have befallen a Canadian of all visitors.

## EVIDENCE IS GIVEN BY STRATTON STILL

### Before the Gamey Commission Yesterday

### The Plan of the Attack by the Prosecution Has Been Restricted—The Evidence Ruled by Chancellor.

STRATTON STILL ON STAND.

TORONTO, May 5.—(Special)—The examination of Hon. Mr. Stratton was continued today before the Gamey enquiry commission.

PROSECUTION RESTRICTED.

The proposed line of attack of the prosecution in the Gamey case has been decidedly restricted for the commission have refused Hon. Mr. Blake's application to inquire into the general Liberal campaign fund in the hope of finding the source of the \$3000 paid to Gamey.

WHAT WAS RULED OUT.

Chancellor Boyd ruled that all other evidences shall first be heard and then the commission might if so desired enquire privately into the fund but only during the time referred to by Mr. Gamey from August 1902 to March 1903.

The ruling has considerably weakened the case that has been put forward by the prosecution.
