NEW YORK, July 1—(AP)—The stock market turned on the rallying spigot in today's market and leading issues were washed up 1 to more than 3 points, many to new highs for the year and longer.

A revival of strength in most major commodities apparently was the principal spur for the stock list.

Canadian issues mostly were on the upside. Distillers-Seagram-Dominion Stores International Nickel, Brazilian, Hollinger and Imperial Oil pushed ahead fractions while McIntyre, Ford, and Lake Shore were behind fractions. Walkers Canadian Marconi and Dome were unchanged.

Coppers, steels, motors, rails, rubbers, mail orders, aircrafts, oils and specialties were each given a separate whirl and the majority ended at, or only a shade under, best levels of the session.

The Associated Press average of 60 issues was up 1.2 points at 47, 6 or 4 of a point under the year best. The composite of 30 industrials was up 1.5 points at a new high since Oct. 30, last year. Traders estimated 2,024,820 shares against 2,381,350 Thursday.

Profit taking tendency in stocks was evident at the start. In view of the 2 1/2-day holiday beginning at noon tomorrow but the ease with which offerings were taken discouraged sellers.

Rails were buoyed by a slightly more than seasonal increase in last week's freight loadings. The Dun and Bradstreet estimate of returning optimism in the retail field was inspiring to stocks in all departments.

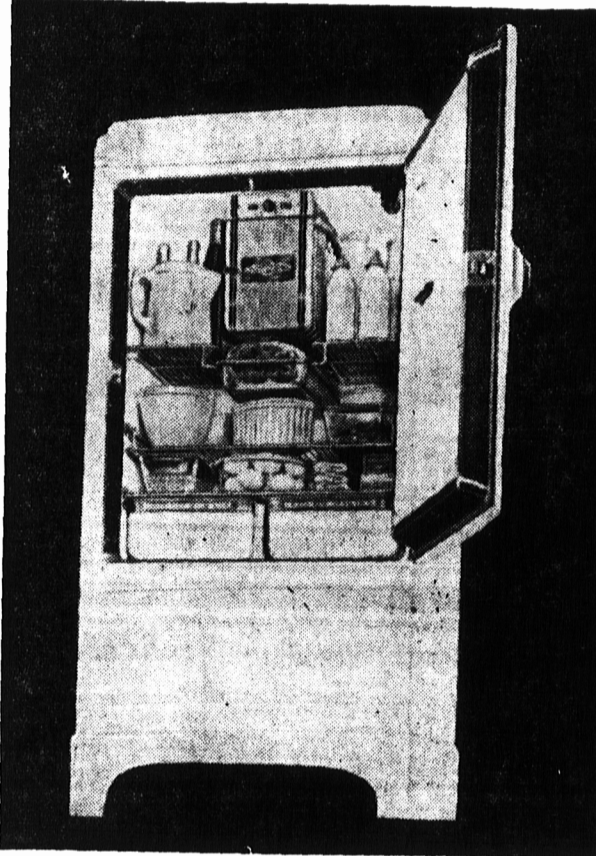

Mill, Marshfield, which is next to the Ludlow Jenkins farm where the children spend such a happy summer two years ago. There will be nine children in attendance in the beginning and it is expected that a few more will come a little later on. Miss Jean Thompson, N. N., who has so capably cared for the children at the previous camps will again be in charge and will be assisted by Miss Beesie MacLeod of the Red Cross staff.

Most of the equipment for this camp such as towels, sheets, pillowslips, toys, silverware, has been secured in exchange for the many coupons which the members of the Junior Red Cross in all the schools on the island have diligently saved and contributed. Quite recently the secretary of the Western Young People's Union, Miss Elma Inman of Augustine Cove, forwarded the splendid sum of \$26.00 as a donation from this organization towards the cost of the camp.

At this camp the children, most of whom have never been able to attend school, are taught a few school lessons as well as handicraft such as knitting and crocheting, etc., so contributions of yarn for this work or toys would be most acceptable and would be thankfully received at the Red Cross Office.
