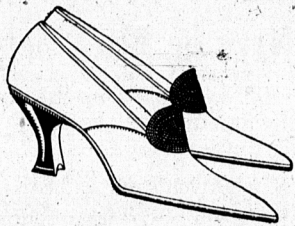

Meeting will be governed by the National Trotting Association Rules, except where they conflict with the above conditions.

Automobiles will be allowed into the centre field at 50c; horses and carriages at 25c. A field will be provided adjacent to the track where owners who do not wish to go into the centre field may tie their horses free.
