ENDORSE THE COMPANY.

In the course of his speech on the Packing Company's exemption bill Hon. Mr. Wear read a letter from Bruce Stewart, head of the well known and popular firm of Bruce Stewart & Co. stating that the firm were in favor of giving them (the D. P. Company) "all favors that are possible." This is a very comprehensive statement, no doubt, but if Mr. Stewart desired to give the company the whole Island, or the whole earth, no one would or could deny his right to say so. Mr. Stewart is one of our best and most enterprising citizens, and he has the courage of his convictions, but when he thus proposes to give the Company "all the favors that are possible" we respectfully submit that he asks too much. We have already had a glimpse of a few of the "possible" favors in the case, including a government guarantee of the Company's bonds, exemption from taxes, a cash bonus and other "favors" too numerous to mention.

Clearly in going thus far Mr. Stewart is far in advance of the common judgment of our citizens, notably as shown at the citizens' meeting. But there are other "possible favors" such as free water, for which other citizens are called to pay, and many others that will readily occur to the mind of the reader. Did Mr. Stewart really mean all that he said in his letter? Furthermore, and as having a bearing upon this question of "all the favors that are possible," it may be pertinent to inquire what favors, if any Mr. Stewart's firm have received from the Packing Company. The manufacturer who has a good customer naturally wishes the customer to receive every consideration and favor. Common report has it that the Packing Company have been good paying customers of Messrs Bruce Stewart & Co. a fact creditable to both parties. But may this connection not have operated to influence Mr. Stewart's judgement in the premises? And would his endorsement of the Packing Company's demands have been quite as broad, sweeping and inclusive under other circumstances?

Again it has been pointed out that Thomas Handrahan, a prominent and respected citizen is in favor of the exemption from taxes asked for by the Dominion Packing Company. If such is the result of his unbiased judgment, Mr. Handrahan has as much right to express it as any citizen has to express a contrary opinion, and The Guardian would be the last to deny it. But Mr. Handrahan is, we believe the agent in this City of the Dominion Coal Company, and there is certainly nothing improper in that. Moreover, prominent members of the Coal Company referred to are also prominent members of the Packing Company. Mr. Shields, was, we believe, recently President of both the Dominion Coal Company and the Dominion Packing Company at one and the same time. If we are wrong in this statement we shall be glad to have Mr. Handrahan, or any other to correct us. Would not Mr. Handrahan under such circumstances, naturally desire to promote the interests and carry out the wishes of the President and prominent members of the two companies referred to? And is his judgment upon a question of exemption from taxes a purely disinterested judgment?

It seems to our mind to be of some interest and value to the general tax-paying public that they should know the exact connections between some of the zealous promoters of the Packing Company's demands and the Packing Company itself. We have dealt with some of them, but perhaps not with all. But to go no farther, we submit to a discerning public whether Hon. B. Rogers, Hon. J. F. Wear, Capt. Read, Mr. Stewart or Mr. Handrahan stand quite upon the disinterested plane of the ordinary citizen in judging of matters at issue between the Packing Company on the one hand and the city and country on the other. One or more of these gentlemen in their over-zeal for the Company's interest set out to hunt down The Guardian and impose upon us we know not what pairs, indignities and penalties. In this they failed miserably, ridiculously. The House and the country alike have pretty full knowledge of the unprecedented measures that have been taken to promote a certain object. It is for the House and the country to say whether that sinister object ought to be attained or permitted.

TWO THOUSAND INVITED.

HAVANA, April 18.—The palace presented a brilliant scene last night on the occasion of the second presidential reception since the inauguration of the government. The issuance of invitations, amount to nearly 2,000 brought a great throng. Practically the whole of Havana's best society, Cuban, Spanish and American, were present, as well as many British, German and French residents, besides the senators, congressmen, principal government officials and the governors of the provinces.
