## AN IMMENSE CROWD VIEWED THE EVENT

### Of the Season in Athletics in Charlottetown at the C. A. A. Grounds Which Was a Grand and Successful Fete Enjoyed by All. Fast Time in Bicycle and Running Races.

There has been a great many athletic events in Charlottetown before last night of more than ordinary interest to the sport loving public. Charlottetonians have witnessed contests--Provincial and Maritime--that have been close and in which excitement reigned supreme. The City and province have sent its quota of people to witness events at the C. A. A. grounds, in the time of its greatest popularity that were considered large, enthusiastic and sporty. The attractions of the grounds have also been in most cases such as to merit these good attendances, a great many of those who have been contestants in track events here having since won honor for themselves in the Dominion Championships.

in evidence in past years, before the advent of a prohibition law began to be noticeable. Just a word or two here of what the competitors have done will perhaps properly introduce the story of the great race.

Campbell of Glace Bay was second in the arena ten mile run in Halifax last spring being beaten by Rogers of Halifax. He also won the ten mile race in Truro on Dominion Day last. Rogers of Halifax was second in the Herald Road Race in Halifax last fall which was won by Hais Homer, fourth in Montreal Star fifteen mile "around the mountain" race, the Indian, being beaten by three men, viz: Longboat, Homer and Selby, all of whom are now professional. He also won a fifteen mile indoor event in Sydney and the ten mile indoor run in Windsor last spring. He won the last ten mile run at the arena in Halifax in which Campbell of Glace Bay was second. Prominent men in athletics who have seen Rogers run say he is the best amateur runner in Canada. Cameron is practically a new man and sprang into prominence only shortly before winning the recent five mile event in Amherst. Paul, of Truro, a brother of M. Paul who trains Michael Thomas, is also a new man and was a competitor in the last mentioned race, beating Thomas. Howard, York, is a new man and showed good form in training. Thomas, Harley and Robertson are too well known here to need any comment. There were some entries from Lennox Island but they did not show up when the starter called his men out.

In preparation for this event the C. A. A. grounds had been fixed up, the track received considerable attention in addition to being officially measured in which it was found that ten furlong laps around would cover ten miles and eighty-five yards. The Grand Stand had been attended to and all seats numbered and reserved. The lighting received special attention. Seventeen 500 c.p. electric lights shed their brilliancy on the quarter mile track and there was also a string of lights at the entrance. Thus everything that concerned the comfort of the public and the contestants was carefully seen to by the efficient committee in charge.

The race began about 8:58, the runners started off in a bunch, Cameron of Amherst, taking the lead. In the first mile all the runners held their positions except Howard, who dropped back at the first quarter. In the first quarter of the second mile Cameron took the lead, followed by Thomas and Rodgers, the remainder following behind in regular order. This continued with no change until the first quarter of the third mile, when Harley, who had been with the hangers on, struck up a faster gait and joined the three leaders, taking fourth place amid great cheering. Then it was that the grind, that tells where endurance is concerned, began. The competitors in the following order, viz: Cameron, Thomas, Rodgers and Harley, with the others some distance behind, ran two quarters when they lapped Howard who had lost some forty seconds in a delay owing to an accident.

The above order continued for quarter after quarter, the same being being broken by some of the contestants being attended by their trainers with a dampened sponge. Harley was making a good showing up to the eighth mile when it became evident that he was weakening and he fell back gradually, and running alone for two and three quarter miles, when he was lapped by the three with whom he had been running only a short time before. A change was also made in the order by Rodgers showing a sprint at the end of the fourth mile, and passing Thomas and Cameron, he took first place which he held for about three hundred yards, after which he was again forced to drop back to his old position. About the end of the eighth mile Harley dropped out of the race. The same positions were held by the three leaders viz: Cameron, Thomas and Rodgers up to the thirty-eighth lap when they were overtaken by Robertson and Campbell. Up to this time Cameron had been running a beautiful race with easy light strides that impelled him along with apparently little or no effort. Thomas short springy stride was just the same as he had started off with. Rodgers was running easily and putting up a following race in which he evidently hoped to find himself leading owing to the others setting a faster pace than they could stand. When they had put three quarters of a mile to go Cameron tried to shake off his persistent pursuers but his attempts in this direction were of no avail for after every fresh trial he would find Thomas and Rogers close behind. It was not till the first 100 yards of the last quarter had been passed that the Halifax boy made his second effort to pass Thomas, and this time he was successful. As he approached Cameron that gentleman promptly improved his gait and the two at a splendid speed came around the 230 turn. Then Cameron relinquished his energies and with a most magnificent burst of speed, finished in beautiful form in the last time of 56:04 2-5.

Rogers was second, his time being only a few seconds behind that of the winner, and Thomas finished in 56:25. Robertson won fourth place and Campbell, fifth.

The race was over, enthusiasm ran high and the applause that greeted the winners assured the management of the complete satisfaction of the public and at the success of the first Championship Ten Mile Run for the Maritime Provinces. The prizes will be--1st, gold medal, (Championship); 2nd silver medal, (championship); 3rd, 4th and 5th, medals.

The quarter mile handicap run was won by M. Paul, (10 yards), second, P. Hooper, (scratch), third, P. Corish, (10 yards) and fourth P. Duffly, (scratch), time 52 sec.

A three mile Bicycle Race which was well contested, was also run off which resulted as follows: First, H. Howatt, second, N. Winchester, third, J. Galdie, time 8:32. Winchester entered the race with an injured wrist which must have interfered with him to a certain extent.

### ALBERTA MEN SELLING STOCK

Think Dollar Wheat Pays Better. Much Meat Already Being Imported.

CALGARY, Aug. 12--(Special)--Patrick Burns, a pioneer packer of Alberta, states that farmers, attracted by \$1 wheat are selling of their cattle with a view of increasing their wheat areas.

As a result the Province will, if the present method of grain farming be continued, be forced to import beef within three years.

Sheep have been imported from Australia and the United States for a number of years and two-thirds of the bacon used in the Province is purchased in the United States.

Live stock values will increase rapidly, but unless the farmers have live stock to dispose of, they cannot reap the benefit from such increased values.
