R.A.F. Squad Winners Over P.W.C. Rugby Team In Close-knit Encounter



The visiting Mt. Allison Academy rugby team took a 42-0 victory in an exhibition encounter with the High School squad of St. Dunstan's University.

And that 42-0 score just about tells the story of the play. The visiting youngsters giving all they had every minute of the game and fighting hard right to the final whistle were no match however for the smooth-working local squad.

Prince of Wales although losing in overtime to heavy Air Force intermediate team, served notice that they are to be highly reckoned with in the fight for the Island intercollegiate series which it was announced will get underway on Saturday afternoon next.

Practically rebuilt from last year's championship squad the P.W.C. team looked good in defeat yesterday. True inexperience showed in times with poor passing particularly in the second half but yesterday's tilt should prove valuable experience to the City college squad.

Announcement of the holding of the series will be greeted enthusiastically by rugby followers. Despite the gloomy outlook more than a week ago the P.W.C. team have kept plugging away in hard practice sessions, that they have improved considerably since the start of the season is a certainty and they should give the second St. Dunstan's team a merry battle of it as they seek to defend the title they won last year.

The series will be a best two out of three affair with the opening game scheduled to take place on the University gridiron Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock. Dates for the remaining games have not yet been set as yet but the opener on Saturday should provide football followers with a gruelling, close-fought struggle.

The players had no alibi to offer for their one-sided defeat to a man stating that the Antigonish boys have smooth, well-oiled machine equal to any in the Maritimes.

Although nothing definite is known it seems probable now that the second game for the Island senior title will be played Wednesday afternoon next. It is a tilt that all are looking forward to eagerly. In every meeting this year the R.A.F. and Saints have engaged in thrilling encounters and Wednesday with the Air Force team with their one-sided defeat the encounter should be even more rugged and more thrilling than in the ones that have taken place in the past.

A little soul-searching has convinced Steve Buzinski that his National Hockey League debut with New York Rangers wasn't so bad, after all.

Fighting across an unconverted try in the last few seconds of a five minute overtime, the intermediate Royal Air Force team yesterday took a 3-0 decision from Prince of Wales college rugby team in an exhibition encounter that was part of the doubleheader played at the St. Dunstan's gridiron arena, five quarter man of the winners gave the Air Force team their win as he outtraced the P.W.C. squad to fall on a loose ball that had been kicked over the P.W.C. line.

It was the only try of a bitterly-fought game that saw play seeing from the opening whistle on several occasions but over-anxiousness, costly fumbles plus some timely booting by the defence kept the game close to scoring until the final seconds were ticking off.

For the next ten minutes play proceeded in a down the field as the teams took turns on the offensive but there wasn't the semblance of a score although Prince of Wales' Elmer Blanchard smartly picked up the P.W.C. team's kicking within two yards of a try on one occasion. Again the R.A.F. came roaring back however the P.W.C. were forced to rough for safety just before the half ended.

The second half was practically a repetition of the first thirty minutes of play. It was a matter of play raging up and down the field as both sides used the boots freely with P.W.C. pulling off some nice passing attacks. The R.A.F. given several penalty boots during the afternoon, were low on placement attempts. P.W.C. lost a great chance to capture the tilt half way through the session when a pretty passing play by the backfield held the ball when over the R.A.F. line and saw an Air Force player pounce on the oval to nullify the threat.

Wales with some timely kicking had play at midfield as regulation time ended.

It appeared as if the game was going to end in a scoreless deadlock at the five minute mark when suddenly from the R.A.F. scrum heeled the ball. As the ball rolled loose from a receiver's hand was kicked over the line and Avery beat the pack to the piskin for the only try of the game. Richards attempted to convert from a difficult angle but fell low at short.

Company, Limited, the most suitable on which to construct a slip capable of handling ships of at least the size of the city ferries to service this Province. (A copy of which letter is attached hereto.)
"AND WHEREAS this Province has adequate facilities for repairing and re-conditioning ships of this size which facilities will, when the dry dock is constructed, be available to the Government, but which are not now being used because of the need of carrying on under and above water repairs simultaneously."
"AND WHEREAS the hydrographic survey of the Charlotte Harbour was completed in nineteen hundred and thirty-seven and it was found that there was not less than thirty-eight feet of water at the lowest low water of ordinary spring tides both inside and outside the harbour making the port available to the larger class of ships."
"Be it therefore resolved that we, the undersigned, petition the Government of Canada to make immediate provision for the construction of a Marine Railway Dry Dock at Charlottetown, as large as the site selected by Mr. Crandall will permit, so that facilities may be provided for docking our ferries and ships of larger size needing repairs and thus enable Prince Edward Island to contribute to the war effort by keeping ships fit for service."
Mr. V. A. Ainsworth, President of the Charlottetown Board of Trade, presided at last night's meeting.
The resolution was read to the meeting by Col. MacKinnon, along with letters from Bruce Stewart and Company and the Crandall Dry Dock Engineers, Cambridge, Mass., substantiating statements made therein. He also read a resolution from the Summerside Board of Trade supporting the request for a dry dock.
In the discussion which followed cogent reasons were advanced for pressing construction of the dry dock as a wartime measure.

On Thursday night next at 8.45. themselves as being fully behind the project.
On motion of Mr. Rowsell, seconded by Mr. Crockett, the resolution was unanimously endorsed by a standing vote.
Mr. Crockett suggested sending a delegation to Ottawa. After further discussion, it was decided to refer the resolution back to the committee, to confer with the provincial government and federal representatives.

Wings Defeat New York Rangers 12-5

DETROIT, Nov. 5 (AP)—Detroit Red Wings buried rookie netminder Steve Buzinski of New York Rangers under a 12-5 defeat in a National Hockey League game tonight before 6,828 spectators. It was the largest total ever scored by a Detroit team, and Carl Liscombe personally bagged three goals and four assists for seven points. The Red Wings, seizing sole possession of the league lead with their second successive victory, swarmed through the Ranger's defence repeatedly to fire at Buzinski, 22-year-old replacement for Sugar Jim Henry, who is in the army. Derolt got five goals in the first period, one in the second and six in the third.

Aiding Liscombe were Syd Howe with two goals each, while Mud Bruneteau, Alex Motter, Joe Carvel and Conny Brown got the Red's defeated Indianapolis Capitals 4-3 tonight in a rough, open American Hockey League game witnessed by 2,500 fans.

The Red twice erased two-goal deficits in making their stretch rally.
