AIRBORNE HOPPERS
MENACE SEEDLINGS

For a mature grasshopper, one hop can be 10 miles long. Thanks to wings, the grown-up's cruising range is much greater than that of the young hopper.
 This reminder comes from H. L. Seaman, Chief, Field Crop and Insect Investigations, Dominion Department of Agriculture, who points out that, because of their mobility, even a few mature grasshoppers can destroy seedling crops of winter wheat or fall rye. Yet these crops can be protected by wet bait spread at a rate of not more than 20 pounds per acre.
 The newer sprays or dust, such as chlordane or chlorinated camphene, are usually effective when applied to the vegetation on which grasshoppers are feeding, but when they are put on crops at the seedling stage, a hopper is likely to destroy much of the young plant before the poison kills him.

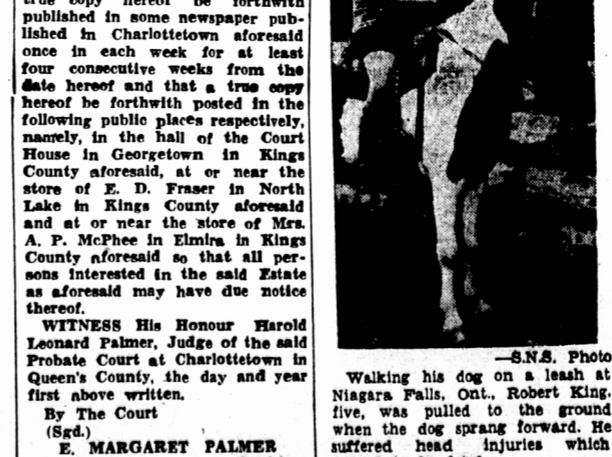
