THE DUTY OF THE GOVERNMENT.

It would seem that our Provincial Government has at the present time an urgent duty to perform in regard to our winter communication and the Tunnel. The Government is on record, by resolution twice submitted and adopted by the Legislature by unanimous vote, setting forth the urgent necessity for this work and another and more powerful resolution to be put on the order of the day. They are also on record by a resolution sent to Ottawa in 1905 to urge these demands.

So far good. But it is important that the Government should be followed up persistently till the object is obtained. To merely make a request and then submit to its being ignored is to invite defeat. Insistence is the only method of obtaining success. The construction of the third steamer has been delayed. The Tunnel project has been met with a dilatory and absurd report for a cast iron lining to cost as much as the Tunnel complete ought to cost. These transient obstacles must be met and overcome with resolute determination.

In the meantime vast and costly public works have been undertaken and where are the projects—the Trans-Canada Railway and the Quebec Bridge now under construction, the Georgian Bay Canal and the opening up of the Hudson Bay route now pressing for construction. Collectively these works involve expenditures of hundreds of millions of dollars, while Prince Edward Island is still waiting for the fulfillment of the union terms by the construction of a work vital to her very existence. Surely this is no time for our Provincial Government to remain idle spectators of what is going on at Ottawa. We cannot believe that they will do so.

Never before was the Tunnel so universally demanded by our people. Never before was its necessity so great, and never before its practicability so clear or so clearly appreciated. It has been demonstrated moreover in these columns, that in view of what it will save and what it will earn, the Tunnel will not cost the Dominion a dollar. Moreover the time to urge it forward is the more propitious from the public utterances of Hon. William Parsley, the influential and capable Minister of Public Works, and from the most favorable notices of the Tunnel enterprise by the leading newspapers of both parties all over Canada.

The matter is urgent commercially and also politically. We are approaching the time of a general provincial election. We have reached the stage when the public man known to be opposed to the Tunnel, or doubtful in his support of it, could not hope for election anywhere within the water boundaries of our Province. Conservative members representing the Island at Ottawa are urging the Tunnel movement forward with all their force. It will not be politic for our Liberal friends to open to the faintest suspicion of being lagards in the movement. The Tunnel

is bigger than party in Prince Edward Island today and the public man or party who desire to succeed should make no delay in getting into the firing line.

We therefore urge our Government to take up this matter again, at once, and with all the energy they possess. This would be a logical course in view of their past commitment. It would be the most popular and therefore the most politic course. It would be a timely action, because, in addition to the reasons already set forth the estimates for public works and services are now being prepared at Ottawa. Finally, it would be the course by which the greatest possible service can be rendered to the Province. As for the Guardian our politics are Tunnel, and we shall lose no opportunity in season or out of season to urge it forward. The Tunnel is coming, has got to come, and the public men who support it will hasten its coming will have good words in these columns for their efforts.

CIVIC INTEREST.

Sir:—The time will soon arrive when our Citizens will be called upon to elect new Council and I for one believe that all Civic positions should be filled by men who are the choice of the people, and not by men who offer themselves as candidates for Civic honors. To my mind there is only one right way of doing things, and in this particular case I think the present Council should call a public meeting for each Ward and let the electors choose their representatives.

Why not have those meetings at an early date before the holiday season arrives, in order that all our business men may be able to attend; and again the Civic Accounts will be closed this year Nov. 30th therefore the present Council will have no excuse to offer for not being able to or in a position to give an account of their stewardship. Judging by the past one would be inclined to believe that some of our representatives think it beneath their dignity to be elected by the electors; immediately before Election they are very dependent but shortly after ward they are decidedly independent. If our Councillors will not do their duty this year, then I would suggest that the electors themselves take the initiative and exercise the privilege of their franchise in its only true sense.
