Head Play Shows Class By Winning 43rd Preakness

Demonstrates Superiority In Outclassing A Field Of Nine—Decisively Trims Derby Rival Broker's Tip.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 14.—Leaving no doubt as to his superiority, Mrs. Silas B. Mason's Head Play, beaten by inches in the Kentucky Derby, today had soundly thrashed nine classy three-year-olds, including his Derby conqueror, Broker's Tip, to win the 43rd running of the Preakness at Pimlico.
Purchased on the eve of the Derby for \$30,000 from Willie Crump, who had paid \$550 for him as a yearling, the great son of My Play merely toyed with his rivals in Saturday's race, finishing four lengths in front of W. R. Coe's Ladysman, the champion juvenile of 1932 which ran his greatest race since winning the Hopeful at Saratoga. The Wheatley Stable's Utopian, supposedly lesser half of the trainer James Fitzsimmons entry, finished in the third hole, a head back of the fast travelling Coe speedster and three spans in front of Ladysman's stablemate, Pomponius.

Broker's Tip, pride of the blue grass from E. R. Bradley's Idle Hour farm, was so lightly regarded by the crowd of 40,000 that he went to the post quoted at the surprising long odds of 13 to 2. And he ran like a 100 to one shot, finishing last in the field of 10. At no time in the one and three sixteenths mile journey was he a serious factor and at the finish he was 30 lengths back of the horse he beat in a hairline and argumentative finish at Churchill Downs last Saturday.
Refusing to take seriously the defeat of Head Play in the Derby, the crowd backed Mrs. Mason's first chestnut colt into favoritism, making the Coe silks the second choice and the entry of De Valera and Utopian the third choice. In the mutuels, Head Play paid \$5.60, \$3.60 and \$2.60 across the board, while his owner from Dodd County, Kentucky, received the purse of \$26,850, a mighty good dividend on her investment. Ladysman returned \$4.00 to a place and \$2.80 to show while a \$2 show ticket on Utopian brought \$3.00.

From Davis Cup Competition—Nunns And Wright Win Both Singles Encounters Saturday—Canucks Now Meet Americans.

HOT SPRINGS, Va., May 14.—The Canadian Davis Cup team is on its triumphant way back to Montreal, having conquered Cuba in the first round of the North American zone of the Davis Cup matches.
Dr. Jack Wright of Vancouver, and Gilbert Nunns of Toronto, wear the chief laurels of victory, four matches to one.
On Thursday next Wright, Nunns and Marcel Rainville of Montreal, will go into action on their own grounds against the highly rated Americans—Ellsworth Vines, Wilmer Allison, George Lott and John Van Ryn.
The Canadian teams will be full of fight and confidence as a result of their play here. The surprise of the matches concluded on Saturday was the exhibition put up by Nunns against the wily and dashing Cuban captain, Ricardo Morales. Wright had small difficulty in clinching the series in the fourth match with an easy defeat of Lorenzo Nodarse, 6-1, 6-2, 6-1, and the best tennis of the afternoon was left to Nunns in the final match.
Morales, star of the Friday double, wherein Wright and Rainville went down to defeat, could not cope with Nunns powerful fore-

hand drives (incidentally a feature of Vines' playing.)
The first set was hotly contested as Nunns had difficulty with Morales fast and deceptive service. But thereafter the Torontonians were the master. He skillfully directed rallies for position as the Cuban dashed from corner to corner of the back court, and finished off his points with sizzling placements. The score was 8-6, 6-2, 6-4.
Wright, veteran general of court manoeuvres, was always on top of the game with Nodarse and contented himself with driving from the back court for placements, seldom coming to the net for those smashing kills known to Canadians as characteristic of his play.
The Cubans who fell Saturday were just reversed from the order which prevailed Thursday when Wright and Nunns won the opening singles. Then the Vancouver physician trounced Capt. Morales, while Nunns defeated Nodarse.

Thousands Greet Queen of the Fishing Fleet on Arrival.

MONTREAL, May 14.—Her bare poles gleaming in the late afternoon sunshine the Bluenose, champion of the North Atlantic fishing fleets, slipped into the port of Montreal today in tow of the Government steamer Bellechasse.
En route to the World's Fair at Chicago and her first venture into fresh water, the pride of Lunenburg concluded the first leg of the long trip from Halifax to receive a hearty welcome from thousands of Montrealers and the crews of the many vessels in the harbor.
Nine days out of Halifax during which she experienced "all kinds of weather," as veteran skipper Angus Walters commented, the trim schooner was towed to her berth at Victoria Pier by a tug which took over the lines from the steamer, which had picked Bluenose up from abreast of Big Island, after the big sail banker had been repeatedly becalmed.
As soon as she tied up, thousands of spectators who had waited for the first sight of the famous fishing vessel were allowed to go on board and get acquainted with the Bluenose, button-holing officers and men for information about the queen of the Grand Banks.
With 11 inches off her keel for the trip to the Great Lakes—Bluenose will be towed to open water on Lake Ontario—Captain Walters expected to remove also a large part of her ballast in order to get through the canal locks, as the Bluenose still draws nearly a foot too much.

PRESIDENT IS RE-ELECTED

Calder Appointed to Govern National Hockey League For Two More Years.

NEW YORK, May 14.—(G.P.)—Governors of the National Hockey League today had re-elected the veteran Frank Calder for a further two-year term as President of the league, and had settled temporarily at least the contentious refereeing question with the appointment of Frank Patrick of Vancouver as managing director of the league in charge of officials.
President Calder met the Governors in an informal conference at Boston Friday night when the decision was reached which led to Patrick's appointment at the annual meeting here Saturday. The Board also named a playing rules committee to report to the President within six weeks any recommendations for improvements in the professional hockey code. This committee consists of managers Adams of Detroit, Eddie Gerst of Montreal, Newsy Lalonde of Canadiens, and Lester Patrick of New York Rangers.
Frank Patrick, a brother of Lester, as managing director will have charge of the appointment of referees and other officials. He will watch the refereeing situation closely around the entire loop, will hear complaints and make recommendations to the Board of Governors. He will be responsible also for enforcing upon the clubs and players the rulings of the referees.
The new league executive was a pioneer of professional hockey on the Pacific Coast and in his playing days with the Montreal Wanderers, was a renowned exponent of the ice game. He organized the now-defunct Pacific Coast Hockey Association, and was its president at the present in the west, he accepted the appointment by wire.
The Governors accorded Mr. Calder a vote of thanks for the many economies the league president had made effective during the
