

EIGHT DEAD IN COLLISION OF TRAINS

Heavy Freight Trains Collide at High Speed. Cars and Wounded Burne.

SPECIAL TO THE GUARDIAN. SPOKANE, Nov. 7.—Eight are dead and four injured as the result of a freight wreck on the Great Northern near Chatroy.

The wreck was the result of a head-on collision at a sharp curve between two heavily loaded trains running at high speed.

Nineteen cars caught fire and three trainmen were burned to death. The dead are members of the crews and three tramps.
