The Latest News From Prince County.

Ives' saw mill, and door and sash factory, North Tryon, will close down in the course of a short time, on account of the scarcity of lumber. The employees of the mill purpose going to the woods to get out lumber to work with.

MR. GEO IRVING, late of Cape Tormentine, but formerly of Cape Traverse, who has been in the P. E. Island Hospital for several weeks, is somewhat improved. It is expected that he will be able to return to his home shortly.

REPORTS from different parts of the province state that the smelt fishing industry is assuming large proportions. A correspondent writes that several parties who are engaged in smelting on the Tryon River have been doing well of late.

Mr. G. H. Crozier of Coleman returned yesterday from Sydney, C. B. where he purchased a business site between Ashby Avenue and Sydney on the Davenport road. The construction of a dwelling and store will be commenced at once and will be completed by May 1st. When ready Mr. Crozier in conjunction with Mr. Hugh Gillis, of Coleman, will conduct a produce business. Mr. Crozier is delighted with the prospects afforded those who are energetic and willing to take advantage of the innumerable opportunities now being offered to those who locate there. A great deal has been said in the past of the dullness of Sydney but Mr. Crozier contends that notwithstanding the accounts current, business is booming.

That this is not the easiest season in which the S. S. Stanley could have made her trial trip is evident from the following local items taken from a Summerside paper dated January, 23rd 1892: "Summerside harbor was frozen over on Wednesday night, the 20th, inst., the first this season that it has been really closed." It will be remembered that on this year boat races were held in our harbor on the 9th and 11th of January, and on the 17th and 18th of the month the harbor was as clear as in summer. Not a particle of snow or ice was visible anywhere. The last trip of the St. Lawrence, which was then on the Summerside Pt. du Chene route, was made that season on December 17th, and owing to some difficulty in making her way out of the harbor she was taken to Charlottetown for the winter. Thus, as has been the case on many other winters, we were without a boat while navigation would have been an easy matter.

Tryon and vicinity is experiencing a religious awakening such as has not been felt for years. Special evangelistic services have been held in the Methodist Church since the 6th of January and every evening the spacious auditorium is filled with an attentive audience. It was the intention that these meetings should close on Sunday night last but the interest manifested has been so great that it was decided to continue another week. The conducting of the services is in charge of Rev. G. F. Dawson, pastor of the church, who has assisted him, Evangelist J. Ritchie Bell of Montreal. The singing of the gospel is made a special feature. A large choir has been organized which, under the leadership of Mr. Fell sings most delightfully. Mr. Bell sings solos and is often joined by Mrs. Dawson in a duet and it is the opinion of many that, of the large numbers of converts, quite as many have been influenced to lead a new life by the singing, as by the preaching. The bible readings which have been given every afternoon at 2.30 have proved very helpful to Christians. On Sunday next similar meetings will be opened up in Victoria.

Supreme Court.

In adjourning the Court yesterday afternoon, the Chief Justice in a few words paid a graceful tribute to our late Sovereign:—"I have before me," said His Lordship, "a copy of a telegram announcing the death of Her Majesty, Queen Victoria. This news will be received with deep sorrow and profound regret throughout the vast possessions of the British Empire. A reign the longest and most beneficent in the annals of British history has been closed. At every session of this Honourable Court, Her Majesty was supposed to be present. Since boyhood we have learned to love and revere the name of Britain's Queen and though she lived far beyond the allotted span, yet it is hard to divest our minds of the idea that our Gracious Queen is no more. In respect to her memory this Court now stands adjourned until to-morrow at noon." The Crier of the Court for the first time in upwards of sixty-three years, then proclaimed His Majesty's Court adjourned, closing the proclamation with the words "God Save the King." Her Majesty had passed away during the sitting and thus the Court which had been opened in her name was closed in the name of the King.
