Think Hotel Suite Was Base For Alleged Embezzlement

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—(AP)—A \$300-a-month hotel suite, well stocked with Scotch whisky, where \$20 tips were given bellboys and from which attractive women carried messages, may have been the base for the alleged embezzlement of nearly \$500,000 from the Mergenthaler Linotype Co., District Attorney Miles F. McDonald said today.

The Kings County grand jury heard its first evidence in the case today.

Mr. McDonald said the women—who included an attractive brunette and a tall red-haired woman—visited the suite in the Manhattan Hotel on Monday or Thursday evenings. Investigation showed that cheques in the Mergenthaler case always were cashed on Tuesdays or Fridays, he added, indicating a "pre-arrangement" by the women to make sure arrangements were all right for the next day.

Late today Mr. McDonald said Joseph Millstein, 48, of New York, sought by police for three days, had been found and was being questioned in the case. He did not elaborate.

Joseph Kupsnecker, 50, president of a cheque-cashing firm, is held under \$100,000 bail as a material witness in the case.

Isadore Rappaport, 55, president of an optical goods firm, who on Sunday was ordered held without bail on forgery and grand larceny charges pending a hearing Wednesday, was taken from jail to a Brooklyn hospital late today. Attendents said he may undergo an operation.

Mr. McDonald said police throughout the country still were seeking James Collins, also known as Julius Lobel or Julius Davis.

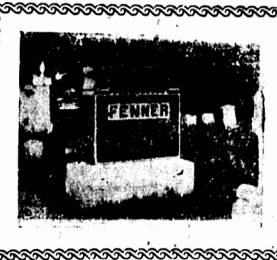

WATERWORTH COLD STORAGE AND CANNING CO.
The progress of any community depends to a large extent on the well-being of its citizens. All members of a community contribute to its advancement, and it is in consequence thereof that all members must be in such a position to so contribute. Farmers, fishermen, business men, and professional men all have their share in the material advancement of any community.
The fishermen of Southern Kings have been most fortunate in obtaining excellent canning and cold storage services at Montague.
In 1943 Mr. Wilfred Waterworth began his first canning plant on the north side of Montague Bridge. Before long he realized that a cold storage plant would prove an added asset to his canning business. This new building, which has a quick-freeze capacity of 50,000 lbs., and 128 private lockers, was placed at the convenience of the fishermen and the public in 1944. This modern, up-to-date cold storage plant has proved an added asset to the community providing fresh and frozen, fish at all times.
The old canning plant, which has since proved too small to handle shipments, has been torn down, and replaced by a larger and more modern canning plant, placed at the disposal of all citizens.
At present Mr. Waterworth is making preparations for a new storage factory which will connect the canning plant and the cold storage. This will be completed in the spring of 1947.
Mr. Waterworth is to be commended for his initiative and industry in providing the community with such a valuable asset, and it is the hope of all the citizens of Montague that his efforts will continue with good success.
