### AN UNTIMELY FROST.

The Baltimore Sun tells that Rev. W. A. Crawford-Frost preached in Holy Comforter Protestant Episcopal church of that city recently taking for his text "Not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit, saith the Lord;" and that in the course of his remarks "he defended the position of the Boers and drew a parallel between their war and that of the American colonies in their war for independence." It is further stated that Mr. Crawford-Frost was born and reared a British subject, he being a Canadian and that he has now taken out his first papers for citizenship in the United States. These particulars sufficiently identify Mr. Crawford-Frost as one who was for some years a resident of Charlottetown and a curate in St. Paul's church of this city. His former residence here, the plentiful misinformation displayed in his discourse, and his present anti-British leanings afford the reasons for this reference.

We quoted Rev Mr. Crawford-Frost's nominal text above as taken from the prophecy of Zechariah. He quickly shifted his position, however to the alleged motto of the Transvaal state—"Right is might," and proceeded to preach therefrom. "The Boer," said Mr. Frost, "is not unlike the Puritan New Englander." We had believed the Puritan to be an intelligent person, much given to reading, and clean in his personal habits. "He is fighting on his own soil, for his home and freedom," says Mr. Frost. On the contrary the Boer is fighting on British soil which he has invaded, and not for home or freedom. In the colonies upon which he has made war, all who pay taxes have a voice in the government. In his own country the Boer imposes three fourths of all the taxes on those to whom he refuses the franchise.

Rev. Mr. Crawford-Frost, proceeds to tell that "in the Riel rebellion in Canada 120 ragged Half-breeds held at bay the whole available Canadian army" and from this proceeds to argue that the Boers will conquer in the present strife and that "the English should recognize the inevitable, grant the colonists their independence and retire from Africa altogether." It is fair to assume that Mr. Crawford-Frost knows no more about the Boers and South Africa than he knows about the Northwest and the Half-breeds. If he is at all a veracious person it is painfully clear that he knows nothing at all about the Half-breed rebellion, or the numbers who rebelled.

There were once a very few misguided persons in the United States who championed the cause of Riel and were convinced that the megalomaniac Half-breed was about to found a great republic in the Northwest. We hanged Riel and by almost universal consent the Northwest is much the better off for the timely execution. Mr. Crawford-Frost now think he sees the rising of a great Boer republic in South Africa what will rival the grandeur of the United States. How flattering it must have been to his hearers, as he pictured "the two great countries of the future, each of which has a continent to itself," with Ocm Paul as the Washington of South Africa!

We confidently believe that Mr. Crawford-Frost has mistaken both the intelligence and the temper of the people to whom he has sought to preach the gospel of Boerdom from a

pulpit consecrated to higher purposes. A citizen of the United States who would come to Canada seeking a residence and citizenship here would not find his best passport to favor in decrying and misrepresenting the great land from which he came and the free flag under which he was born. Equally we assume that intelligent and highminded citizens of the United States will not regard Mr. Crawford-Frost the more highly as a man or as a clergyman because of his assumed hostility to Britain and Canada, or because he thinks South African Boers or Northwest Half-breeds are among the higher types of manhood. The sentiments expressed by Mr. Frost will however, sufficiently prevent any undue regrets for his departure from Canada, or for his change of allegiance.

## Russia And Japan.

M. Routkowsky, agent of the ministry of finance of Russia in Washington, complains of the attempts which he says were made in Europe recently to create in this country the impression that the relations between the governments of Japan and Russia were strained.

"Immediately after these statements had been authoritatively denied by the Russian ambassador and the Japanese minister here," says M. Routkowsky, "other sensational rumors were started, presumably at Berlin and directed against the credit of the Russian empire. These are followed by libels, directed against the statesman to whose care was entrusted that credit, and an appeal, made to Japan in an article on Russian finances to attack that country before her trans-Siberian railroad could be completed.

M. Routkowsky gives some figures on the subject, that during the twelve years from 1887 to 1898 the ordinary revenue of the Russian government steadily increased from 820,000,000 roubles in 1887 to 1,584,000,000 roubles in 1898, and that during the whole of that time with the exception of two years (1897 and 1899) the expenses were considerably less than the receipts this surplus for the twelve years amounting to 320,000,000 roubles. For the same twelve years, the extraordinary revenues and expenses of the government make a total, the former of 1,125,000,000 and of the latter 2,075,000,000.
