

QUEBEC BRIDGE AWARDED TO CANADIAN COMPANY

OTTAWA, April 5.—Hon. George P. Graham announced in the house today that the government had made a contract for the construction of the super-structure of the proposed bridge across the St. Lawrence river, near Quebec, with the St. Lawrence Bridge company, organized by the shareholders of the Dominion Bridge company, of Montreal and the Canadian Bridge company, of Walkerville. The agreement calls for the erection of a railway bridge with two four-foot sidewalks, to cost at the estimated quantities, \$8,650,000. There has been deposited with the government as security for the carrying out of the work, \$1,297,500, or 15 per cent. of the contract price. While the contract has been made by the government with the St. Lawrence Bridge company, Mr. Graham said the parent company, the Dominion Bridge company, and the Canadian Bridge company had both guaranteed that the terms of the contract would be observed.

In making his announcement, Mr. Graham said the straightening out of the difficulties surrounding this undertaking has been a work fraught with much anxiety, and not a little industry. The undertaking was

such a vast one that the engineers engaged by the board fully realized that every step should be made only after the fullest investigation. Difference of opinion arose between these able men, which were altogether of technical nature and could only be understood by men with a theoretical and practical knowledge of bridge building. "The original intention, and in fact the scheme contemplated until very recently, provided for roadways and street railway traffic as well as steam railway tracks. The majority of the board, after full consideration recommended the acceptance of the tender of the St. Lawrence Bridge company upon a design of their own which included provision for street railways and driveways. In doing so they called attention to the fact that another design had been submitted by the same company for a purely railway bridge. By the adoption of the latter proposition it was pointed out a very considerable saving could be made. The government fully considered this suggestion and as a result the contract has been signed for a railway bridge which will also have two four-foot sidewalks.

OBITUARY.

With the dawn of April 1st the pure spirit of Mrs. Patrick Egan of Hampton winged its way to meet its life of seventy-two years. Her deceased had been in failing health for the last few years but nothing serious was anticipated until last October, when her medical adviser, Dr. M. J. Murchison, pronounced her case hopeless. She was frequently visited by her spiritual physician, Dr. Curran of Kelly's Cross, and by him was well fortified and prepared for her last journey. Throughout her long and painful illness her patience and resignation to the Divine Will seemed marvellous to all who visited her. To her husband, who is almost inconsolable, she was a good and loving wife, to her family a wise and amiable mother and to her neighbors a generous hearted and charitable woman. On the whole she was regarded as a model type of Christianity and the vacancy caused by her demise will long be felt outside as well as inside the family circle. She had been twice married and by her first marriage to the late Stephen Burns, leaves to mourn a son, James Burns of Haverhill, Mass., and a daughter, Mrs. Margaret B. Locke formerly of Lynn, Mass., but who was a constant attendant at her bedside to the last. Those left by her marriage to Patrick Egan are Mrs. Fred Dunsford of South Melville; Annie, Lizzie and Lauretta, all of whom are prostrated with grief at the loss of the one they loved most on earth. But the ways of God are inscrutable and they humbly bow to his decree. She also leaves a brother Owen Moan of Kinkora. Her funeral which wended its way to Kelly's Cross Church on Monday, April 3rd, was well attended and was a silent tribute to her memory. Requiem Mass was sung by Rev. Dr. Curran who also conducted the services at the grave. The pall bearers were: Charles Toole, George Farrow, Kenneth Holme, George Dunsford, Jerome MacGuigan and James Gordon. May she rest in peace.
