DEMISE OF JOHN D. MUNROE, WELL KNOWN PRINTER AND PROMINENT IN MASONRY.

John D. Munroe, printer, prominent Mason and first commander of Company F. Naval Brigade, died early Saturday evening at his home, 297 Belmont street, after an illness of but three days after pneumonia. While on his way home from the meeting of Godfrey de Bouillon Commandery, Knights of Templar last Wednesday evening, he contracted a severe cold, which developed into pneumonia. He was doing well, however, until Saturday noon, when he suffered a relapse, and from that time he sank until the end. But very few knew he was ill, and the news of his death caused a great shock to hundreds of acquaintances.

John Donald Munroe was born in Prince Edward Island 56 years ago. When he was five years old he went to live with his uncle, Roderick Munroe, Lyndale, and lived with him until his father, Allan Munroe, sent for him to join his parents in Fall River, Mass., and he came to this city when a young man. He was employed for a short time in one of the mills here, but finding that this did not agree with his health he secured work in the Evening News office, and learned his trade there with the late Samuel Fiske. Later they formed partnership as Fiske & Munroe and did a general printing business, of which after a time Mr. Munroe organized it into a corporation, as The Munroe Press, and became the treasurer, an office which he held at the time of his death. He was also for some years treasurer of the Fall River Daily Herald Publishing Co.

Mr. Munroe had been prominent in the Masonic order for many years, and through this was well known all over southeastern Massachusetts and Rhode Island. He was a 32nd degree Mason, and was in 1908 and 1909 right eminent grand master of the Knights Templar of Massachusetts and Rhode Island. He was a past master of King Philip Lodge, past high priest of Fall River Royal Arch Chapter and thrice illustrious master of the Fall River Council of Royal and Select Masters. He had also filled all the chairs in Godfrey de Bouillon Commandery, Knights Templar, and had the very unusual distinction of having been at the head of King Philip Lodge, the Chapter, the Council and the Commandery.

Mr. Munroe's military career began in 1878, when he joined Battery M. M. V. M. He was made second lieutenant in 1883, and a few years later became lieutenant. When the first Naval Brigade company was formed here on Sept. 30, 1892, he became its chief and continued to hold that position until Dec. 11, 1894, when he retired from the rank of lieutenant commander. He was also for many years drillmaster of the High school cadets.

Mr. Munroe was twice married. His first wife was the daughter of Joseph Bowers. His second wife, who survives him, was Miss Grace Beattie.—Boston Exc. Many friends in this Province will remember the late Mr. Munroe.
