TO SPEAK HERE - Mr. George Houghton, Secretary of the Canadian Retail Federation, Canada's largest retailers association, is scheduled to speak in Charlottetown October 20. It was learned last night. He will address a dinner measure by the Board of Trade, the local retailers association and service clubs on price ceiling price control. Mr. Houghton is to make a tour of the Maritime next month. He will speak at other centers in addition to Charlottetown. He is familiar with the policies of the War-time Prices and Trade Board and is consulted frequently by officials of the Board.

TO REDUCE WORKING HOURS - The Wednesday half-holiday will be retained indefinitely as a war measure by a number of business firms in Charlottetown, it has been learned. In addition to this many business houses will reduce their hours to comply with the request of the Government's suggestion to limit the working hours in one week to 56. Several leading department stores have announced that they will open at 8.30 a.m. instead of at 8 a.m. Drugstores expect to observe the mid-week holiday on which days they would close at 1 p.m. Each evening except Saturday, when they would remain open until 10 p.m., the drugstores would close at 8 p.m. No announcement has been made by the grocers yet.

SPEAKS AT ELDON - The members of the Eldon Branch of the Canadian Legion turned out in numbers at their regular monthly meeting in the Hall at Eldon on Monday evening in spite of bad weather conditions. SAINT JOHN, Sept. 29 - (CP) - A union of Maritime Municipalities Finance officials was recommended today by J.H. Lowther, of the Finance branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. Lack of uniformity in municipal statistics across Canada left no basis for making comparisons.

\$500 Damages To Plaintiff
Damages to the extent of \$500 was awarded the plaintiff in the case of H. E. Gantwell, plaintiff vs. Mrs. Ada Grant, defendant by His Honor, Judge C. Gavan Duffy in the Queen's County Court yesterday. The plaintiff sued the defendant for damages caused when the west wall of the King Edward Hotel fell on his adjoining barber shop, crushing it to the ground March 7 last.
In handing down the judgment, Judge Duffy said the following applied to the case: "There must be reasonable evidence of negligence. But where the thing is shown to be under the management of the defendant or his servants, and the accident is such as in the ordinary course of things does not

happen if those who have the management use proper care, it affords reasonable evidence, in the absence of explanation by the defendant, that the accident arose from want of care."
