In speaking of the R.A.F., U.S.A.F. and R.C.A.F. Air Commodore Kerr stated that the R.C.A.F. is playing a big league and, though it appeared that we would not be their equal in numbers, the difference could be made up in quality. Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, M.P. spoke briefly, mentioning the fame of the R.C.A.F. Air Navigation School in their accomplishments in long polar and international flights and assured those present that the town of Summerside "basked in the reflected glory of the fame of the local R.C.A.F. station."

outlined some of the improvements now being made to bring the Summerside station up to standard in regard to its facilities.

Tenders have been called for, he said, on a contract to renovate three barrack blocks. These buildings will be divided into two-man cubicles each of which will have a built-in wardrobe and desks. Now six or seven men occupy one room.

The buildings will be nicely finished inside and will have modern lavatories and shower baths. At present he said, the central heating system which had been in the Mount Pleasant airport is being installed in the Summerside station. It is one of the most modern systems available. Next Summer all the buildings will be painted white.

Wing Commander Gross also stated that new kitchen equipment is being installed in the messes and the hospital in which propane gas will be used as fuel. The number of men now attached to the station consists of 635 Air Force personnel and 170 civilians.—S
