MR. MEIGHEN IN MONTREAL

The reception tendered Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, the Conservative Leader, in Montreal, as reported in yesterday's Guardian, indicates very clearly that the representation in the House of Commons is not a measure of political sentiment in the province of Quebec.

The best element in the province of Quebec, as in the other provinces, recognizes the strength, ability and honesty of the Conservative leader and the soundness of Conservative policy. They recognize also that the last two elections were not run on political grounds but on misrepresentation and calumny.

Mr. Meighen told his audience that he had accepted an invitation to address a meeting in the City of Quebec and intended to speak there and in other centres in the province and his announcement was received with cheers.

ADVICE AND WARNING. Both as an advice and a warning, the Government has issued a circular which is given along with every license to car-drivers. It is well that others as well as car-drivers should know something of the rules of the road and what drivers may be held responsible for.

- 1.—Drive to the right. 2.—The car on your right has the right of way. Watch your right! 3.—Be sure your brakes, Klaxon horn and lights are in good order. 4.—Keep your number plates free from mud. 5.—Drive slowly when passing schools. 6.—Be careful when approaching railroad crossings. 7.—Do not crowd your front seat. 8.—Number plates are not to be changed from one car to another. 9.—Be sure your driver is licensed and over 17 years of age. 10.—Dealer's number plates are not to be used on Sundays. 11.—Stop if you have an accident or see someone else in trouble. 12.—Intoxicated drivers are liable to fine, to imprisonment and to have licenses cancelled. 13.—When passing a vehicle proceeding in the direction you are going, always sound the Klaxon horn and pass on the left side of the vehicle in front. 14.—Always dim your head lights when approaching another vehicle travelling in the opposite direction. 15.—Every motor vehicle shall have an efficient muffler.

Notes by the Way

Some things have happened during and since the election of October last about which the six Liberal members from the Maritimes and the newspapers supporting them have been amazingly silent.

It was formerly thought worth while for the Maritimes to be represented in the Government. It is no longer a matter of any consequence whether they are represented or not? Both the leading parties have hitherto insisted that it was a matter of consequence, which if neglected or denied would involve humiliation and call forth protests in the press and in Parliament.

Liberal members from our own Province and from the sister Maritimes have by their silence apparently given their consent to non-representation in the Government. Never before have they given the Government a more constant thick and thin support.

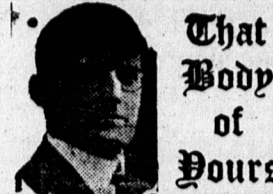
During the months past since October there has been much discussion of Maritime Rights and a Commission has been appointed to determine whether any just rights of the Maritimes have been denied or neglected, or any wrongs inflicted upon these Provinces.

Exclusion from the Cabinet, whether by neglect of our Liberal-Progressive rulers, or by consent of our Liberal representatives in Parliament, will not be claimed as contributing to Maritime honor, prestige, importance and self-respect, either within the Dominion or beyond its boundaries.

Every self-respecting Liberal in Prince Edward Island knows under what Administration this last humiliating abdication of our provincial and Maritime Rights has occurred. Equally they must be conscious of the fact that under no previous Administration, whether Conservative or Liberal has the political status of the Maritime group been so degraded.

Good crops and good prices have given our people in this Province a fair measure of prosperity. But we still endure the narrow gauge railway and, for the time, a ferry steamer that is unsafe in a moderate summer wind.

For five years past the King Government, supported by two members from Charlottetown and Summerside has led our fair Province onward and downward toward political insignificance.

Sir John Adam And The French Language

In the advance edition of the programme for the Montreal Conference on Education and Citizenship the title of Sir John Adams' address was given as "The National Importance of Language in Education." To many of the members of the National Council of Education, including the present writer, who had some previous experience, not altogether pleasant of the conflicting views of the people of the two central provinces, Ontario and Quebec, on the dual language question, such a title for an address to be given before a Montreal audience seemed rather questionable, as being ominous of trouble.

But quite apart from its probable controversial aspect the title appears ambiguous and open to question. Why quality or limit the "importance" of language in education? Why use the word "National" at all? Language is important whether national or otherwise. It is not only important, it is essential for there can be no real education without language.

But let us have done with the text, and come to grips with the address itself and its author. Then Sir John Adams few men of greater distinction appeared at the Montreal Conference whether viewed as a practical educationalist or as a writer on educational subjects.

The limitation of the space allotted to me will not permit of even the briefest outline of this notable address, so rich in suggestion, so broad in outline, so far-reaching in vision, "Language teaching in education," he said, "is essential to the organization of a national spirit worthy of culture."
