MONEY FOR BRIDGE OVER THE ST. JOHN

EDMUNDSTON, Jan. 15.—Representative Daigle of Madawaska (Me.) has introduced a bill in the Maine legislature at Augusta providing for an appropriation of \$250,000 sufficient to take care of half of the proposed international bridge over the St. John river between this town and the Maine village. The Canadian government is to bear the other half of the cost.

The legislature of Maine passed several previous bills granting money for this important structure but as the cost of material and labor constantly rose up to the close of the summer season last year the fund appropriated was not sufficient, and another vote is necessary.

It is expected that sufficient money will be available in a few weeks and that work can be started at both ends of the bridge. The bridge will take the place of a cable ferry at this important point where there is a heavy motor traffic between Maine, this province and Quebec.

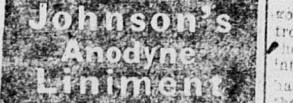

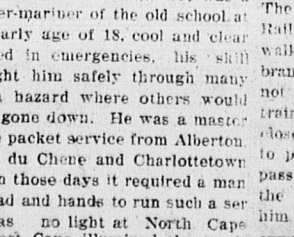
