There was a large representative gathering of Zion congregation in attendance at the Thanksgiving Service held last evening in connection with the seventy-fifth anniversary services of the Church.

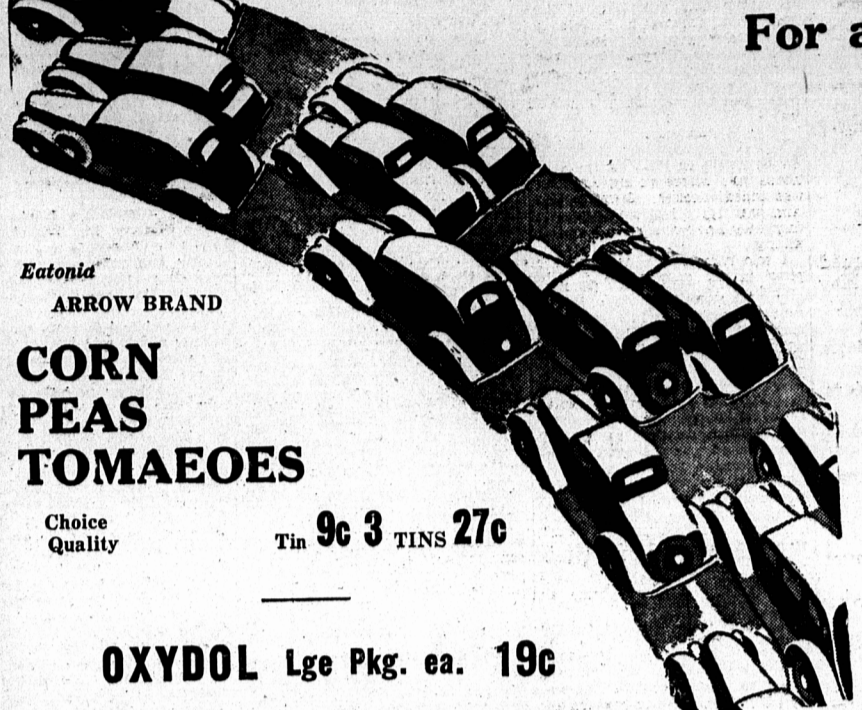
The most interesting feature of the evening was the presentation of life membership certificates to four members of the Women's Missionary Society, who had served that organization faithfully and energetically for a period of many years. Mrs. Rev. G. C. Webster, the Presbyterian President of the Women's Missionary Society read the addresses to the recipients and Mrs. A. A. MacDonald, President of Zion W. M. S. presented the certificates. The recipients were: Mrs. James Patterson, who had been a member for 47 years; Mrs. Murdoch Ross, Miss Mary MacLeod and Mrs. Mary Patterson.

The Minister, Rev. G. C. Webster, then introduced the guest speaker, Rev. J. Kier Fraser, of Alberton, who gave an eloquent and inspirational address on the subject "The supreme motive of the Christian." "For me to live in Christ," taking as his text Philippians 1:21: "For me to live in Christ." Dr. Fraser, in the course of his remarks, stated that most men have some one supreme motive in life. With some it may be the acquisition of wealth, with others honour, or learning. With the Apostle Paul the governing principle is expressed in the text "For me to live in Christ." This should be the supreme motive of every Christian and if the Christian life is to be lived in its true perspective there must be concentration. A man who in the secular pursuits of life is half-hearted, is an object of contempt, so the church member who is not thoroughly devoted to the work of his Master is not worthy of the name Christian. In closing the speaker urged his hearers to adopt the motto contained in the text as the governing principle of their lives. If Zion is to go forward into her new era, the members must be true to this great truth. The final service in connection with this celebration is to be held tomorrow evening, when the unique ceremony of burning the mortgage will take place.

No one derives any compensation from the association other than the enjoyment of making it possible for the music lovers of Charlottetown to hear great music, by great performers in person. 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### N.B. LIBERALS LAY PLATFORM

(C.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) FREDERICTON, N. B., May 15.—Nine remaining planks in the opposition's 17-clause platform were laid before the people of New Brunswick here today as the Liberal party headed by Hon. A. A. Dysart made the opening bid for honors in the provincial election to be held June 27. A Liberal convention held here today adopted the whole platform containing 17 major sections in which the party's views on provincial questions ranging from dairy products to liquor, and from lumber to fish were set forth.

Hon. A. A. Dysart, leader of the Opposition in a speech before the New Brunswick Legislative Assembly last February disclosed eight points of the platform on which the Opposition chose to ride into the coming campaign.

Speaking before the convention today Hon. Mr. Dysart stated: "In industry must be vitalized—agriculture assisted. If we wish to get results agriculture must be placed on a sound footing."

### SEEK TO CURB FLU OUTBREAK

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) SEATTLE, May 15.—Medical science's battle against the "flu" epidemic, cause of off-recurring epidemics the world over, found a new field of action tonight as Point Barrow, Alaska—where a sudden scourge already has claimed at least 15 lives.

Sensing the "importance" of any new epidemic, two Philadelphia physicians, Dr. Horace Pettit and Dr. Sergeant Pepper, arranged to leave Newark, N.J., by plane late tonight in a dash calculated to take them to the ice-bound Arctic Coast in well under 100 hours.

By air to Seattle, by ship to Juneau, and then by air to Fairbanks and Point Barrow, the two University of Pennsylvania bacteriology experts will rush to the scene of the Arctic outbreak.

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
