RUSSIAN EMPEROR DINED WITH KING

Brilliant Luncheon Held on Royal Yacht at Cowes in Honor of Emperor.

COWES, Aug. 4.—Last night the Russian Emperor and Empress dined with King Edward and Queen Alexandra and the members of the British royal household on board the Victoria and Albert. All the ships in the harbor were illuminated. The dining room was beautifully decorated with red roses and on the table was a magnificent display of gold plate. Beside the King and Queen and the Emperor and Empress the guests were the Crown Prince and Crown Princess of Sweden, the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, Premier Asquith, Sir Edward Grey, Reginald McKenna and M. Iswolsky, King Edward, in proposing a toast to the Russian monarch, said: "I am glad that you have had the opportunity of seeing the most powerful and the largest fleet ever assembled, but I trust Your Majesty will never look upon these ships as a symbol of war; but, on the contrary as a protection to coasts and commerce, and also as a means of upholding the interests of peace."

In responding, Emperor Nicholas said that the magnificent naval review he had witnessed bore full testimony to England's greatness. His Majesty said he always would remember the days he had spent with the beloved and venerated Queen Victoria. In concluding, the Emperor said: "May the friendly welcome given by Your Majesty and the Queen and the people to the members of the Duma and in the winter to my squadron be a token of the cordial relationship between our two countries founded on common interest and mutual esteem."

The Call of the West.

HARVESTERS! HARVESTERS!

Again the West calls to the East for help to assist in harvesting the greatest crop Western Canada has ever produced. The increased acreage under cultivation and the splendid weather conditions that have prevailed throughout the entire season have combined to produce a wheat crop estimated at from 125,000,000 to 150,000,000 bushels, and to successfully harvest this enormous crop will require at least 30,000 Farm Laborers.

The West can supply but a small fraction of this number, and consequently the Western Farmers are obliged to look to the East for assistance in order to save the crops, which of course require to be harvested within a certain period of time.

The Canadian Pacific Railway, realizing the demand for labor in the West, will, as in previous years, make Farm Laborers Excursions, and it is expected the laborers from the Maritime Provinces will be required to leave the second or third week in August. The exact date will be announced later, and the general arrangements will be along the lines of excursions run in previous years.

The work of cutting, threshing and garnering will give months of steady employment to a vast army of laborers, and when the appeal for help comes from the West, it is earnestly hoped that the Maritime Provinces will respond in large numbers as heretofore. Thousands of Farmers from the Provinces are now located in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, and they will gladly welcome those from the East who will go to their assistance. The rate is so low that it is almost equal to a free pass. It affords a splendid vacation trip and a great opportunity to see the Great West at his best. Even by working part time only sufficient can be earned to pay the expenses of the trip, and passengers can return home from their vacation with money in pocket.
