Sad Drowning In Halifax Harbor

(Special to The Guardian.) HALIFAX, July 2.—Gordon Henry, aged 19, son of W.A. Henry, K.C. was drowned while yachting in Halifax harbor this afternoon in company with Michael Dwyer, another youth of the same age. They were aboard the yacht "Chum" preparing for the start of a yacht race. Later, in the Bay when off Point Pleasant, a squall sprang up, the boom jibbed and struck both young men. Dwyer was knocked to the bottom of the boat, Henry was swept overboard. He was aboard for a few moments and when he came to he saw his companion far in the wake of the yacht. He threw a life buoy from the yacht and then brought the boat about but by this time Henry had disappeared.

Italian Landowners Fire on Peasants

(Dom. Press Special.) ROME, July 4.—Five persons were killed and 38 wounded today when 30 landowners fired into a crowd of excited peasants near Milan, according to a despatch received here. The peasants demanded more money than they received for work done for landowners.

French Ambassador Arrives in Berlin

BERLIN, July 4.—Charles Laurent, French Ambassador to Germany, presented his credentials to President Ebert yesterday. He declared he would do his utmost to bring about the economic rehabilitation of Germany, and would assist in the steps necessary to carry out the Versailles Treaty, but stated the Berlin Government must help him in accomplishing his task. Before leaving the presidential office, Mr. Laurent conversed with Herr Ebert for twenty minutes.

14 Democrat Candidates Up

Negotiations were proceeding on the question of increased wages but as the newspaper proprietors refused to insert an advertisement from the compositors announcing the publication of a new newspaper, the printers walked out in sympathy.

Eastern Question Now Paramount

PARIS, July 2.—The recent check to the Greek offensive has made certain that the Turkish question will once more be opened up at Brussels as the paramount issue before the allied powers. French foreign office admitted to the United Press that the eastern question probably will be one of the first subjects taken up for discussion in conference.

Lemburg Captured By Bo'sheviki

POLES FALLING BACK

LONDON, July 4.—A Bolsheviki attack upon Poles in Rovno region is continuing progress, according to a Moscow wireless message received here. The wireless declared that Red forces were 27 miles east of Rovno and were pushing the Poles back rapidly. The Polish retreat also continues in the Moseyre region the wireless said where the Bolsheviki took many prisoners, and a quantity of supplies.

Beautiful Statuary Found in Italy

ROME, July 2.—The ancient Etruscan city of Veii, fifteen miles from Rome, has yielded up a group of statuary in Polychrome terracotta, two figures of which, the Apollo and the Mercury, archaeologists are agreed in characterizing as finds of first class artistic importance. The Apollo, indeed, a work of Ionic-Etruscan art, dating from about 500 B. C. impresses even the non-expert at once as being a work of extraordinary strength and beauty.

Peace Conference Sits at Brussels

Events in Ireland Are Driving Fast To Fresh Trouble

BELFAST, July 4.—Events in Ireland are marching rapidly to a crisis. It is apparently the Government's policy to force the issue regarding the transportation of military troops, and at numerous railway stations throughout the country small bodies of men are presenting themselves as passengers, only to be told that the drivers and firemen refuse to take the train further, would soldiers insist on occupying seats. In each instance the railwaymen concerned are summarily dismissed, and as no drivers are forthcoming to assume the duties of those discharged, the railway lines are blocked in many places.

Renown Battles Australian Gale

ALBANY, West Australia, July 4.—H. M. S. Renown has had an extremely rough trip from Sydney where the great warship left last Friday night with the Prince of Wales on board. On Sunday last a fresh breeze developed into a hard gale from the west, which the Renown met head-on, making heavy water forward. The Prince observed from the observation bridge while huge seas, driven by the westerly gale, raced at the Renown, which charged them at a speed of twenty knots, sending the water mast-head high, the spray falling in continuous cascades, in which rainbows appeared.

Shoes Likely to be Cheaper

The big shoe factory of the AmesHollen McCready, Limited, will be shut down shortly for an indefinite time because of the oversupply of shoes. The company employs nearly one thousand hands. Slackness in trade close its plant throughout the curtailments, and it is also learned that the Canadian market is being flooded with shoes from the United States, which the manufacturers here are unable to sell on their own side of the border. There has been a sharp cut in the prices of shoes in Canada, as Canadian jobbers who have purchased American shoes are holding up the prices to the level of the prices on this side of the border. Another large Canadian plant which will shortly close its plant is also, in many children's shoes which it is unable to dispose of. This firm is contemplating opening stores in various parts of Canada to find an outlet for its surplus. If these stores are opened it is believed there will be a marked tumble in prices. The shoe trade is in a bad state in New England and many factories in Lynn, Haverhill, Brockton and elsewhere are closed. Part of their surplus stock is being dumped on the Canadian market.

Tourist Agent of C.N.R.

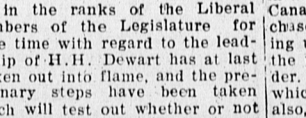

DECIDE ON GERMAN BONDS

PARIS, July 4.—It is officially announced that the Reparations Commission has determined upon the form of bonds Germany must deliver pursuant to Annex 2, Part 8, of the Treaty of Versailles. The announcement does not disclose, however, what form this is. The commission has also decided favorably upon the Belgium request for the delivery of blood stallions and mares, in addition to the restoration in kind of the animals removed by Germany during the war.
