Votes of thanks were passed to the Ladies' Aid, the Guild, the Choir, the Ushers, the Financial Secretary and also to the Chairman and Secretary of the meeting.

Mr. Paton arrived in London "just in time to give President Wilson a hearty welcome." The Londoners certainly turned out in good style and gave him a grand reception. Mr. Paton was lucky along with thousands in getting a seat in one of the London auto club windows where he obtained a splendid view of the great procession and a good look at the King, President Wilson, the Queen, Princess Mary and Mrs. Wilson. One of the greatest attractions in the parade was the Scots Guards and Pipe Band. On the second day of President Wilson's visit Mr. Paton again had a splendid view of the great procession from the old Guildhall, and was seated within half a yard of Mr. Lloyd George. The people fairly went wild over the Prime Minister and surged round him. Mr. Paton afterwards proceeded to Edinburgh, Glasgow and Paisley.
