"I have five," replied the man. "That is why I am here tonight." Then he left. Mrs. Morris refused to give the police a description of him.

AUTO ROBBERS CAPTURED IN LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 14.—Their faces smeared with powder and their uniforms perforated by bullets, two policemen managed today to arrest three out of five alleged automobile bandits. The others—one of them a woman—were betrayed by the prisoners, according to the police, and are now being sought.

The three prisoners gave the names of Bert Hamilton, a chauffeur, George Johnson and Frank Smith. When arrested they shot at the officers but surrendered under the hot return fire. The prisoners are said to have used an auto to aid them in robberies.

MORE WEST VIRGINIA STRIKERS ARRESTED

CHARLESTON, W. Va., Feb. 13.—State troops early today marched on Hilly Grove, a village that has been headquarters for the striking miners, and rounded up 65 alleged strike rioters. This brought the total of miners now under arrest to 125, the first of whose trials will be held before the military commission at Paint Creek Junction.

Reports from the strike district today said miners held a meeting, at which the life of Gov. Glasscock was threatened and leaders planned a general assault on the headquarters of the militia. Evidence against the men already arrested is almost as strong as are reports from the strike district, and it seems likely that many will go free.

TO PLANT FLAG IN FAR NORTH

(Continued from page one) The original idea was that the government should make up the difference between what was guaranteed by the National Geographical Society of the United States and the American Museum of Natural History. From the present outlook, however, this will be changed, the explorer released from his American connections and the whole trip will be financed by the Canadian government.

Steffanson expects to be absent three winters and four summers if successful. He will go to the territory to the far north of the Canadian mainland to plant the flag and make scientific observations. While the expedition will be under the immediate direction of the geological survey, the interior and marine departments will be interested. A number of Canadian students temperamentally trained for the work and possessed of scientific knowledge will be taken along. The explorer's idea, as he states it, is "to round up the map."

CAPT. SCOTT'S BODY WILL REMAIN WHERE HE DIED.

CHRISTCHURCH, N. Z., Feb. 14.—Commander Evans, when questioned today as to the suggestion that the bodies of Captain Scott and his comrades should be recovered, said: "The best people to judge are those who served under Captain Scott. Had he been in the same place as the victims we should have wished our bodies to remain at rest where we have given out best efforts in the cause we so earnestly believed."

Commander Evans will remain in New Zealand until the arrival of the widow of Captain Scott.

STEAMER MONTFORT REPORTED DISABLED

ST. JOHN, Feb. 14.—A wireless message received here late today from the C. P. R. steamer Montfort, Captain Davidson, off Cape Race, bound to St. John from London and Antwerp, stated that one of her propellers is badly damaged, and she is forced to proceed under the other screw. Further word is expected to-morrow via Sable Island.

DIES AT 81; MOTHER IS ALIVE

GUELPH, Ont., Feb. 14.—Richard Mitchell, one of Guelph's oldest residents and at one time partner of John Galt, founder of the city, died this morning, aged 81. He was Mayor twice, City Clerk for many years and a walking encyclopedia of all the past events of Guelph and Wellington County. His mother is still alive in her 99th year.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 13.—Secretary Knox and Ambassador Jusserand signed a convention today to extend for another period of five years the arbitration treaty between the United States and France which will expire March 12.
