**ANDREW CARNEGIE ON ARBITRATION**

NEW YORK, April 7—Andrew Carnegie has declined to become chairman of a proposed United Association of all organizations now working for an arbitration treaty between this country and Great Britain. He believes that this is not the time to accelerate public opinion, but that it is wiser to allow the United States senate to deliberate on the form of a treaty unhastened and unprompted.

Mr. Carnegie believes a treaty will pass, and he has assurances that many prominent democrats will cooperate with the administration to that end. Among those he names whose position, he believes, "cannot be doubted," are Governor Dix, of New York, and Governor Wilson, of Connecticut, Champ Clark, and William Jennings Bryan, none of whom have hitherto in any way indicated their attitude.

Mr. Carnegie's letter is in the simplified style of his preference. He says he has of late been deluged with invitations to preside at meetings and attend banquets in various cities, and he invariably declines.

**STEAMER BRUCE IS BREAKING UP BADLY**

LOUISBURG, N.S., April 7—A telegram was received here last night that the body of the unfortunate man that was drowned at the time of the stranding of the steamer Bruce had been recovered near the scene of the wreck late last evening. A team was immediately sent to Bauline and the body was brought to town, and will be prepared for transportation to Newfoundland. A heavy sea was running yesterday at the scene of the wreck and John Bennett, who recovered the body had much difficulty in securing it, the surf at that place being particularly heavy.

A small amount of silver was found in the pockets and the watch had stopped at 7.43. The heavy sea of yesterday told badly on the Bruce, the main part of the saloon was carried away, and the doors of the forward house washed off, the main topmast broken clear, and a number of deck planking could be seen floating away. The weather for the past four or five days has been so unfavorable that no salvaging could be done. A very severe electrical storm of about twenty minutes' duration accompanied by a heavy downpour of rain and hail passed over the town this afternoon and a verdict of accidental death was returned. The remains will be forwarded to Newfoundland by tomorrow's trip of the Gloucester.

The body was seen floating in the vicinity of Bauline and was secured by a man named Bennett and brought ashore and it was later taken here. Pike was a man of 35, well built and smooth shaven. He was one of the forty fishermen who were on the Bruce en route to Vancouver, and to whose service the passengers of the ill-fated Bruce probably owe their lives.

**ITALY WELCOMES GERMAN PRINCE**

ROME, April 7—Exceedingly friendly exchanges marked the dinner given by the King and Queen at the Quirinal last night in honor of Crown Prince Frederick William and the Crown Princess, who came here to present the congratulations of the German Emperor and Empress on the occasion of the Italian jubilee. Covers were laid for one hundred.

King Victor Emmanuel said that the visit of the crown Prince and the Crown Princess to Rome during so important a celebration was a manifestation of the intimate friendship between Italy and Germany, which were united by many past events and by a common civilizing mission which would never fail. German and Italian unity, he said, together with the Triple Alliance, ensured a long period of peace in Europe.

VANCOUVER, B. C., April 6—Fish dealers confirm a story that an Indian woman living on a small island north of here cut a piece of flesh from her body in an effort to procure food for her children when they were starving.

The woman and children were in desperate straits. The last scrap of food had been eaten the day before, and there was no game although the woman searched until her strength gave out.

In this condition she cut a strip of flesh from her body. This flesh was used as bait to catch fish, and thus sustained life until aid arrived.
