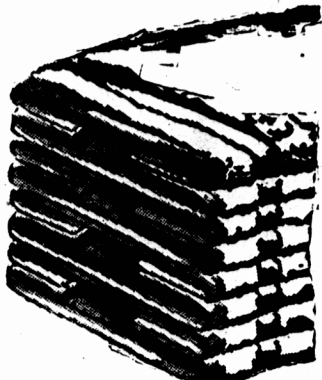

A five-week-old North Tryon child was found dead in its bed yesterday morning by its parents. The baby, Margaret Elaine Noonan, was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Everett Noonan. It was alive and well at 2 a.m. yesterday but was dead at 7 a.m.

Coroner Dr. Austin Delaney of Summerside and members of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police investigated. The coroner said he believed death was caused by asphyxiation and said it was likely the child had vomited during the night and then inhaled some of the material. He said such deaths were not uncommon. It was decided an inquest was not necessary.

Judgment Given in County Court At Summerside

Judgment by default for the full amount claimed was entered in the County Court at Summerside yesterday, with Judge L. G. Lewis presiding, in the case of International Fox Foods Ltd. vs. Ronald McNeill, T. L. Compton represented the plaintiff.

The day was taken up with hearing evidence of the plaintiff in the case of Lawrence Fitzgerald, Richmond vs. Clayton Day, Wellington, a claim for \$430 damages resulting from a truck accident. Three witnesses were heard for the plaintiff. According to the evidence given the accident occurred at the junction of the McNeill Road and the Barlow Road in Western Prince County. The plaintiff's truck, driven by his brother, Fred Fitzgerald, was proceeding on the Barlow Road and as it reached the junction of the McNeill Road it was confronted by the defendant's truck and it is claimed that the defendant's truck came so far into the intersection that the plaintiff's truck was forced into a ditch to avoid it and had to go over a culvert damaging the undercarriage.

The case was adjourned at the end of the day till October 26 when evidence for the defendant will be heard.
