THE CHRISTIAN PRESIDENT OF THE CHINESE REPUBLIC.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen, President of the Republic of China, whose name figures frequently in the cable despatches of late, is thus described in The Christian Guardian of Toronto: "Dr. Sun is small of stature, and looks like a modest, affable scholar. Yet for twenty years this man has been dreaming of, and planning for, a Chinese republic. He is a true patriot, rigidly honest, and utterly fearless. Even when an enormous price was placed on his head he went about his work as quietly as ever. Moreover, Dr. Sun is a Christian, and is the son of a native Chinese evangelist. He was born at Patsan, near Canton about 44 years ago, and graduated at the Medical College at Hongkong. For years he has foreseen what has now come to pass, but his friends in England and the United States simply laughed at him when he told them his dreams. But the dreams have come true, and the dreamer has helped to make them come true. Whatever may be in store for the new republic we are glad to know that its first President is such a man as Dr. Sun Yat Sen is known to be." Think of what it may mean to have a Christian President and ruler over

the hundreds of millions of people in China! Practically all the world save China, Japan and Turkey are now, at least nominally under Christian rule. The Mohammedans, although under gross superstition, are not heathen, or idolaters. They worship in some sort the one God to whom Abraham prayed. Japan has a number of Christian statesmen, military and naval commanders who are held in high regard by the Emperor and the nation. And that the heaven of Christianity is working powerfully in China we have abundant evidence in the fact that the reformers, whether they shall succeed or not immediately in their plans, have chosen a man of Christian faith as their leader. And with the spread of Christianity has come a great growth and expansion of civil and religious liberty. Fifty years ago there were millions of slaves in America. Thirty years ago the serfs of Russia were liberated. Within a generation Japan, Russia, Turkey, Persia, and now China, have given their people some voice in the affairs of government through representative institutions. Thus Christianity and liberty are moving on and with ever more rapid strides to the destined consummation.

course, or pernicious pest, or any thing that would be more injurious to the farming community could possibly be introduced upon the Island. This may seem strong language to use, but I have just recently come from the Old Country where they are exceedingly numerous, and nothing that was ever invented for the use of man was more loudly cursed, and more intensely execrated by the farmers, and nothing ever caused them more inconvenience, or made it more difficult and unpleasant for them to carry on their business successfully, than did the popular use of the motor car on the public highways. They are not only a feature of glaring extravagance and superfluous wealth, but many of the users of them seemed to entertain the most insolent disregard both for human and animal life, and were frequently designated "road hogs" for their callous indifference to both human and animal safety. There are two most objectionable features against their use on this Island. The first is, that the roads are almost everywhere too narrow, and the second, that it would be almost, if not quite impossible to control the nervous and highly strung Island horses. Accidents would be frequent, that is certain, and many other serious inconveniences would be experienced by the farmers, of which only those who have had practical experience of this automobile curse on the public highways can speak with authority. Since I came here to live and farm, it has been one of the greatest compensations for several disadvantages I have experienced, to find the use of the motor car prohibited. And while I live here, my earnest wish is, that it may continue to be so. And I would especially appeal to my brothers farmers, and to all who have at heart the true and best interest of the farming community, to bring to bear all the pressure which they possibly can upon our legislators for the purpose of securing the permanent maintenance of the prohibition law as it now stands. THE PROPOSED TELEPHONE CABLE.

Referring to the proposed telegraph and telephone cable across the Straits between this Province and the mainland, referred to in The Guardian of yesterday one or two additional observations may be in order. Should the Government undertake the duty of providing the cable it should be adapted for both the telegraph and telephone service. It should also have a sufficient number of wires to enable it to be used by more than one company for either of the two services named. We hope in time to have more than one telegraph company competing for business in Prince Edward Island in order that we may have the benefit of competition, heretofore denied us. At present, after the long agitation for improved service, the people of this Province are still denied the night letter rate privileges that are enjoyed by the people of the mainland. We understand that the Maritime Telegraph and Telephone Company would be quite willing that the cable, if provided by the Government, should be open to use by any Canadian Telegraph Company, but in any case no contract should be entered into which would tend to create or continue a monopoly or prevent free competition in electric service across the Straits.

the Prime Minister had an estimate of the cost of this service, and also whether an order in council had been passed in regard to the matter. In reply to Mr. Emmerson the Prime Minister said that the great inconvenience of the present system had been brought to his attention in Parliament and also during his visit to the Island, upon both of which occasions he had strongly advocated an improved service.

INSSTITUTE MEETING. Lots 27-28 Institute met in Middleton Hall on Jan. 18th at 3 p.m. President Cameron occupied the chair and the secretary read minutes of last meeting. On motion they were adopted. The President stated that the subject for discussion was: Which is the most profitable for our farmers to keep, the dairy, beef, or general purpose cow? Chas. Craig spoke strongly in favor of the dairy cow. Colin Craig gave the record of one of his cows which had produced 360 lbs of butter fat, equal to 432 lbs. of butter, which, with skim milk added, was worth \$24.61. RURAL POST OFFICE BOXES.

It will be remembered that in 1908 the late Liberal Government and their followers rejected the proposal to establish mail boxes along the rural mail routes, but later changed their minds and adopted what had before been the declared policy of the Conservative Opposition. The House was dissolved on September 17, and it was in August previous that the decision was reached to establish rural delivery. Haste was necessary to get the movement going, and it now transpires that on August 14, 1908, an order was given to an American firm to supply the boxes at \$3 per box. There was no need, except a political one for this haste, and the boxes should have been made in Canada. But they were ordered in the States and without tenders being called for. And many more were ordered and delivered to the Government than have yet been used. According to a statement issued by the present Postmaster General a few days ago in Parliament, 18,844 of the boxes have been placed while 90,333 boxes are not in use, their cost being \$270,999. Of this amount, however, \$150,000 is yet unpaid and may not be until the boxes are placed in use. In the meantime the Government is rich in post office boxes.
