Fashioning the weekly meat ration of a family of four can be satisfying and appetizingly done. If you crave a roast for Sunday's more leisurely dinner, this week's suggestion is loin of lamb, four pounds of which can be had for two coupons. Aside from Sunday's good eating you should each be assured of a thick cold chop for Monday's dinner, and perhaps some trimmings for lunch on Tuesday. A cheese dish for Tuesday, such as a soufflé or macaroni combination, can be counted on to do double duty. Along with ration economy it will provide the milk-drinking objects of the family with the invaluable nutrients of dairy products. Wednesday's corned beef with a green savory cabbage, now a market specialty, is a dish which is bound to win friends and influence appetites. If you are lucky there will be remnants from your coupon's worth for sandwich fillings or salad accompaniment. Veal cutlets for Thursday are good value in terms of tokens, pennies and eating enjoyment. Friday brings the cycle of eating round hurdle and bake unrationed spare ribs serving them with a barbecue sauce. This will bring you to the end of the week with three tokens to use as and when an emergency arises.

Remembrance Day At Summerside

The Remembrance Day service in Summerside will commence at 10:45 tomorrow morning in Memorial Square and the following instructions are issued for the benefit of the units concerned: The undermentioned will be in position at the above time and place as follows:

- 1. R.C.M.P. on Band Stand. 2. Town Council on Band Stand. 3. Legion, South side of Monument, facing same, in line. 4. R.C.A.P. East side monument, facing west, in line. 5. 17th Armoured (B) Regt., East side monument, facing west in line on left flank of R.C.A.P. 6. Girl Guides, Boy Scouts, Sea Cadets, Air Cadets, West side monument, facing east, in line. 7. Summerside Fire Department, north side of monument, facing south. 8. Reservations at Square as follows: Legion Aux. Red Cross Corps, St. John's Ambulance, I.O.G.E., O.W.L. and others. A representative from each unit will report to Major T.H.E. Inman at the Square at 10:40 for instructions. Medals, ribbons and berets will be worn.

At conclusion of the program units will march off independently, and all ex-service men will proceed to St. Stephen's, thence to Travellers Rest for similar service, and will reassemble at 2:00 sharp at Legion Home to proceed to Misouche.

Graves Of Canadians West Of The Seine

GRAVES OF CANADIANS - In two cemeteries the graves are kept well decorated with flowers brought by the French which the Canadians helped to liberate.

GRANVILLE LANGANNERIE, France, Nov. 9. (CP) Individual photographs are being taken of each of the graves which mark the last resting place of 8,000 Canadian fighting men west of the Seine river.

Capt. Frank W. Kemp of Listowel, Ont., said the pictures will be processed by men of No 3 Canadian graves registration unit which he led into France on D-day plus two. The pictures will be sent to the next of kin of each fallen soldier.

Canadians killed west of the Seine are concentrated in two big cemeteries near Caen. There are 2,100 graves at Beny-sur-Mer overlooking the English channel and the landing beaches, while at Pretreville-sur-Late on the famous Caen-Mantes road there are another 3,500.

Temporary white steel crosses, about eight feet high, stand over each grave. Inscribed with name, number, initials, rank and unit of the soldiers. A small white cross is in the centre of each cemetery. These are used in the event of war, will replace the steel crosses.

Kept Well Decorated - In both cemeteries the graves are kept well decorated with flowers brought by the French which the Canadians helped to liberate.

Capt. Kemp said there are about 300 Canadian graves in the British cemetery at Bayeux and about 20 at Ryes. Dead of the Canadian Parachute Battalion are buried in the Bayeux cemetery beside men of the 6th British Airborne division, with whom they served.

Only 150 Canadians missing west of the Seine have not yet been found. Capt. Kemp said a specialist doctor and fingerprint expert identified most of the bodies which lacked identity discs.

The Captain interviewed Mayors of every town and hamlet in Normandy in his search for the dead. Frequently the job of retrieving the dead meant walking across mined fields or through mined orchards.

The French were most cooperative and many of the still missing 150 may be found, possibly in the Falaise gap where investigations were begun soon, or along interior roads which the Canadians might have been held by a last stratagem as they were marched away as prisoners of war.

DIES OF INJURIES - Miss Lillian Duchemin, District Commissioner, on behalf of the Guides presented the books, about 250 in number, to Dr. Creelman, who sincerely thanked one and all for them. This was followed by singing "The King, the Parade" reassembled and marched to St. Paul's Hall where a most delightful Rally was held under the direction of Mrs. Harry Cudmore, assisted by the Charlottetown Guides.
