of the district was held in the
Montague School with Mr. Malcolm
MacKenzie of the Department of
Education acting as chairman. At-
tending besides the teachers of
the district, were supervisors, H.
J. Hynes and Angus Gilmore. The
main topic of discussion was the
fundamentals of the school. Mr. Mac-
Kenzie had with him a large num-
ber of books which the teachers
perused. Some discussion centered
about the elementary treasury
readers which may be subject to
change in the future. It was ap-
parent that the course of study
for the lower grades seems to be
overloaded, thereby eliminating the
time for necessary drill in the im-
portant fundamentals of arithmetic
and English, the lack of which is
only too apparent in the higher
grades. It is possible that with a
more concentrated drill on these
fundamentals, this difficulty would
be overcome, but teachers find it
almost impossible owing to lack
of time, as a consequence students
suffer in more advanced work
and teachers are expected to know
the fundamentals. This and many
other problems face the teachers
in their daily work. During Educa-
tion Week, the Department and
teachers are trying to bring to the
parents the problems of education,
and what is being done in an effort
to solve them. It has also the
purpose of making parents educa-
tion conscious and the various
broadcasts should go far in ac-
complishing this purpose. Officers
elected at the meeting included
President, Mr. Leslie Stewart,
Principal Montague High School,
and Secretary, Miss Zella Mac-
Leod, teacher of Lower Montague
School.
