DELIVERY OF FOXES.—The delivery of 1913 foxes is now under way—the first company to take delivery of any of their options being the Murray River Fox Ranching Company which are taking over a pair to-day from the Victoria Silver Black Fox Company of Charlottetown.

The President, M. J. McLeod, and one of the Directors, William Kearney are in town to-day completing arrangements for the transfer of foxes. They were met in Charlottetown by representatives of the American parties who are heavily interested in the Murray River Silver Black Fox Company, namely; Col. C. S. Emery and A. A. Bishop of Newport, Vermont. These gentlemen represent a few parties who are taking about \$20,000.00 worth of stock in the Company and came down to make payments for their stock. The pair of foxes delivered to-day are of the Dalton, Raynor and Oulton strains and are the third option in the Victoria ranch which is noted for its high quality of its foxes.

Below we publish the result of the work at the Charlottetown Business College during the term of 1912-13, and it must be most gratifying to the management to know that a very large percentage of those who received diplomas have been successful in obtaining positions. During the vacation Principal Miller has been busy in getting positions for his graduates and in re-arranging the courses of study, cutting out in some places and adding the latest so that the students of 1913-14 will have the very best in everything pertaining to accounting as well as shorthand. The system of training at the C. B. C. is of such a nature that any new ideas may be readily incorporated into the various courses.

This year special attention will be given in the business training department to higher accounting, Corporation and Joint Stock bookkeeping, the work being finished from manuscript specially prepared by the Principal. Our fox people who have associated themselves into companies will do well to consult Mr. Miller if they wish a system of bookkeeping easily kept and intelligible to every shareholder. Another feature will be a study of the history and geography of Canada, in particular, and other countries generally.

The shorthand and typewriting departments will still maintain their high stand, and as the best, and the students will be given an opportunity to do more practical work. It is the desire of the management to bring the various classes in closer touch, which will give the shorthand students an opportunity to do more practical commercial work such as writing out of invoices, drafts, bills of exchange, note, checks and other work the result of the transactions in the business training department. The Principal will then be able to keep on file the daily work of each student, Geo. E. Inman, Esq., K. C., will start his series of lectures on Commercial Law in September, and a regular educational feast has been prepared for the students of 1913-14.
