**Rickard Gives Expert Opinion On Big Fight**

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y. July 18.—Jack Dempsey today answered the criticism that he was overworked, had slowed up and was performing clumsily on his feet by offering the prediction that he was in far better shape than before the fight with Tunney, and expected to beat Jack Sharkey at the Yankee Stadium in New York on Thursday night.

"I'm on edge now, and I just want to take enough exercise to keep me limbered up," said the former champion. "I have trained to be able to go fifteen rounds if necessary, but I expect to win the fight before it goes the limit.

"I don't need any more boxing. I have plenty of it. I think Sharkey is a good fighter, and do not make the mistake of thinking I under estimate him. I am confident of beating Sharkey and hope that after that I will get the opportunity I have been looking for—to get a chance to win back the title from Gene Tunney."

GENOA, Italy, July 18.—Divers have succeeded in locating the steam ship Washington which was sunk in October, 1917 by a German submarine while on the way from America to Genoa. They found the vessel at Camogli, not far from Genoa.
