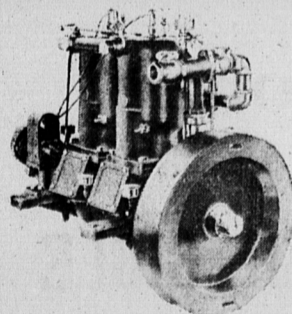

MILLS DEMAND ANOTHER INCREASE IN PRICE OF PAPER

When war conditions restrained print paper makers from renewing pre-war contracts, Mr. R. A. Pringle, K. C., was appointed paper commissioner to regulate the selling price. Shortly afterwards the manufacturers were allowed to increase the rate from \$40 to \$50 a ton. Later, after much investigating, the makers were allowed to add another \$7 a ton, with instructions to the consumers to deposit the extra \$7 in a bank to the credit of the commission, awaiting final adjudication. The mills are now asking a further increase to \$60 a ton and the right of appeal from the commissioner's rulings. Today the mills have notified the government of their intention to stop manufacturing if they are to be subject to such restrictions.

This promises not only a paper famine but a newspaper famine—a suspension of all the papers in the country. The strangest feature of the trouble is the virulent assault on Commissioner Pringle by Ontario and Western publishers and a few in the East. These publishers are most unfair towards the commissioner, who has been given a most thankless duty, and one that he has endeavored to discharge with great ability and impartiality.

He is assailed by both parties to the controversy with extreme violence suggestive of malice, but he is a strong man, a fair-minded man and fearless. We fail to see what is to be gained by unfair attacks on the commissioner. If the newspapers are forced to double their selling price, the public will still be getting the cheapest thing manufactured, Montreal Star.
