Rev. Jas. Simpson was a passenger to Souris Saturday where he conducted services yesterday.

The Sun Life Assurance have the thanks of The Guardian for a pretty household calendar.

Rev. J. C. Spurr, Pownal, went to East Point Saturday. He preached at the opening of the new church there yesterday.

Rev. Edwin Smith, M. A., was a passenger to Montague Saturday where he preached yesterday very acceptably to large congregations.

Rev. W. E. Motley conducted services yesterday in the Christian Baptist Church, city; his place in Montague being filled by Rev. R. W. Stevenson.

The Stanley arrived here Saturday at noon from Miramichi the pilot refusing to take the responsibility of going up the river to tow the steamer Uria, which is ice bound.

An interesting Missionary meeting was held in the Methodist Church, Montic, on Tuesday, Dec. 1st. Addresses were delivered by Rev. G. M. Young, Charlottetown, and Rev. E. Bell of Souris. The collection was good and the singing excellent, Miss R. Cox presiding at the organ.

The second quarterly meeting of the Methodist church, Souris, was held on Thursday evening. There was a good attendance of laymen. The financial statement was an encouraging one and all the officers of the board were re-elected. The meeting gave their pastor three months vacation to visit his native land sometime in the near future.

The Norwegian steamer Urania which cleared from Chatham for Brown Head last Friday, has been detained by ice and cannot get out. The government steamer Stanley left Prince Edward Island for Chatham Tuesday to give her assistance, but left for the Island again on Thursday, having been unable to render assistance. From present appearances it looks as though the Urania is imprisoned for the winter. The Chatham World says: "The whole thing is a scandal and a disgrace to the port. The Nova Scotia Steel company has the ship on a time charter, said to be £700 a month, and the failure of its agent to promptly engage steamers to help her out before the ice thickened and extended is inexplicable."—Halifax Herald.

At the Police Court yesterday the two adjourned Prohibition cases were decided against the defendants. Andrew Murphy was fined \$200 or four months imprisonment and Roderick McNeill was fined \$100 or two months. The latter case involved a principle which will have a great effect in the efficient enforcement of the Act. McNeill was connected with the stable work at H. C. Connolly's. Those desiring liquor at the bar were sent to the stable where they gave their money to McNeill and awaited results. The latter disappeared, while the purchasers stood in the rear of the stable, and returned a few minutes later with the desired article. Weeks and Wear for the defence contended that there was no evidence of a sale or violation of the Act by McNeill. The Magistrate decided otherwise, however.

The following item referring to a traveller and vocalist well known in Charlottetown is going the rounds of the New Brunswick press. "Mr. A. E. Massie the well known traveller would not have arrived home Thursday evening, but would have been held up in St. John till following morning, but for a piece of clever strategy. In company with a commercial traveller named Borden, he embarked on the Prince Rupert at Digby, Thursday; which was considerably behind time leaving for St. John, and certain to miss the Fredericton connection, as well as the Montreal connection, Mr. Borden desiring the latter. The difficulty was solved by the quick-witted Massie, upon whose advice the following despatch was wired from Digby to the C. P. R. authorities at St. John: "Please hold Montreal express for passenger. (Signed Borden)" The St. John people anxious to oblige a great political personage, either Sir Frederick Borden or Dr. R. L. Borden, the Conservative leader they were not sure which, held the train, as requested, and the two commercial men reached their destinations, without a lay over at St. John."

CARRIED TO PRISON MATCHES,

Crow's Nest Coal Men Sent to Jail for Carrying Them Unlighted to the Mines.

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4.—A month's imprisonment, with hard labor, and without the option of a fine, may seem to be an excessive penalty for the apparently trivial offence of carrying a match "unlighted" into a coal mine, yet this was the punishment meted out by Stipendiary Magistrate Forbes, of Fernie, last week, in not one, but in several cases, and it is endorsed by the entire communities of coal field towns.

Experience has taught them, possibly, that the accidental ignition of a match in coal workings is attended with the greatest danger of explosion, causing enormous loss of life and property. The law is stringent on this point, and it was quite as much for the safeguarding of miners' lives as that of their employers' property.

Offenders in the past have escaped with fines; but this method of punishment does not seem to have had the desired deterrent effect. Now imprisonment and rock-breaking will be given a trial.

The recent prosecutions were the result of a systematic search conducted at three collieries of the Crow's Nest Pass Coal Company at Morrissey, Coal Creek and Michel.

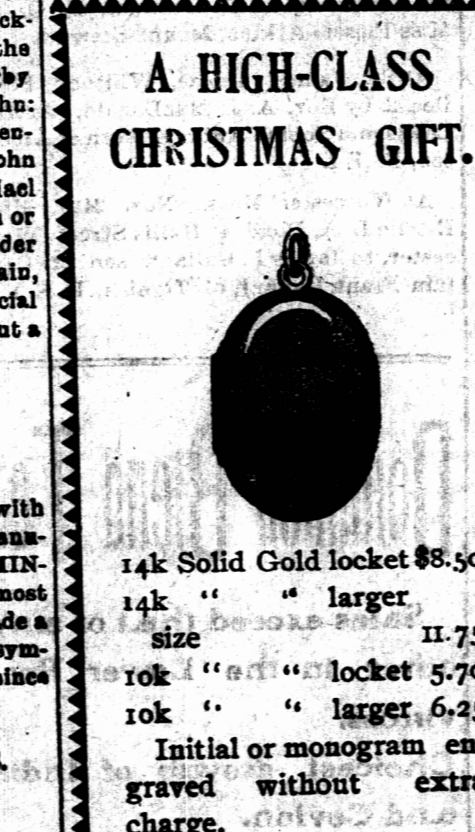
NO NOTICE YET.
