 SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 30—(CP)—The total of Victory Loan subscriptions in New Brunswick stood at \$11,212,100 tonight. Sales today amounted to \$1,328,700. The Provincial objective is \$25,000,000. Gloucester County, with 79.8, is leading in percentage of public sales, while the armed forces in the province have subscribed 75 per cent of their objective.

Commencing the first of May the Department of Health will conduct Diphtheria Immunizing Clinics in every school. A physician and a Public Health Nurse will visit each school three times at three weeks intervals. Be sure and get all children six months of age and upwards protected. Your children's health is your responsibility—do not falter in your duty. Diphtheria can be prevented.
