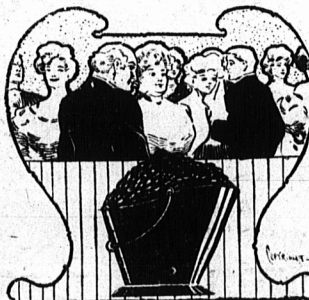

BELGIUM FIRST CANADA'S CRY

Belgium the First to Help the Empire Should be the First to Receive the Aid of Dominions.

"Belgium First" is the keynote of a recent article from the pen of that versatile writer Col. Henry Watterston. As only Col. Watterston can denounce an enemy so he denounced the barbarity of the German nation, but out of all the venom of his denunciation he brought the one plea "Belgium First."

"Belgium First" might well be selected as a motto for Canada—a war cry for Canadians. Belgium was first in the defence of the cause of liberty, first to receive the blow which was dealt at the British Empire and first to stay the hand that would have swept across the sea and ruled the British Dominions. Well Canada may say Belgium first, as Col. Watterston suggests, and well may Canada answer the plea of Belgium's people in their hour of distress.

Belgium was the first to defeat the attack which was launched at Canada as a part of the Empire and now when Belgium is destitute and her women and children standing on the brink of starvation Canada's thought should be of Belgium first. A little can bring happiness to Belgium today. Bread is all her people ask. Ten dollars will keep a Belgian woman or child from starvation all through the winter. There is no trouble, no worry about it. The Belgian Relief Committee, 59 St. Peter Street, Montreal, looks after that. The Committee guarantees the expeditious forwarding of funds, the equitable distribution of food and assurance that none of the gifts will fall into the hands of the Germans.

LONDON, Jan. 3.—The War Office announces that hereafter commissions as officers will be granted only to men who have completed their course as recruits, and that preference will be given to men who have served with the expeditionary force.
This order, which presumably will apply to all units organized under the compulsory system, is expected to make possible more rapid training of troops, as well as to insure a satisfactory standard of qualification for officers.

I.C.R. TAKES OVER LINE TO MUSQUODOBOIT

The Service in the Meantime Will be on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday. Leaving Dartmouth at 3 P.M.

HALIFAX, Dec. 31.—The operation of the Dartmouth to Deans branch of the government railway system will be undertaken on Monday, January 3rd. The trains will run from Upper Musquodoboit, leaving at 5.30 in the morning and arriving at Dartmouth at 10 o'clock in the forenoon, thus making the run of 70 miles in five hours. Returning the train will leave Dartmouth at 3 o'clock in the afternoon arriving at Upper Musquodoboit at 7.30 o'clock in the evening. The trains will run on three days each week—Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays. It will be a mixed service—passenger and freight. Carriers, Pagano, the contractors who built the road have been running the service for some months and have thereby had a great convenience to the people travelling from Halifax to Middle Musquodoboit. Now it is to be undertaken by the I. C. R. as a branch of the system that extends from Halifax to Winnipeg and soon may reach clear across to the Pacific. The desire of the people on the shore and through the Musquodoboit valley is at last to be gratified with the operation of the road as a part of the I. C. R. and in this respect the beginning of 1916 will be memorable. It will be noted that the road, in the meantime, will be operated not to Deans, but to Upper Musquodoboit. 6432-1-6ME11.

Prof. Cumming of the Agricultural College, Truro

In the annual report of the Dept. of Agriculture for Nova Scotia, for year 1914, writes, referring to their experiments in connection with commercial fertilizers as follows:

been the cause of unnecessary friction between them and the managers of creameries. A series of tests and experiments bearing on this point have recently been completed by the branch of the Dairy and Cold Storage Commissioner of the Department of Agriculture, at Ottawa, and the results obtained are published in circular No. 14 of that branch. It is desirable that creamery patrons should know the results of these experiments. Managers of creameries may apply for and secure from the Publications Branch of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, sufficient copies to supply each patron. Individual copies will be sent to those who apply for them.
