Prospects For New Rink Dim In Summerside

Prospects for a new skating rink in Summerside being built by the Town became poorer last night when it was learned from its chairman of the citizens' ways and means committee, Dr. H.E. Clark, that he had been informed that the Recorder had given an opinion which appeared to be to the effect that the Town has no power without an amendment to its act of incorporation to build a rink. Dr. Clark said that he had called a meeting of his committee for this evening to discuss the matter with particular consideration being given to this latest development. His information came in a letter from Mayor J.F. Arnett advising him that an opinion had been received from the Recorder, Mr. E.H. Strong, K.C. and he felt that the committee should know of it for their deliberations. A copy of the opinion was enclosed which is as follows: "As requested by the letter from the Town Clerk of November 17th, 1949, in respect to holding a plebiscite on the question of the Town building a rink, and paying for it out of the taxpayers' money, he states as follows: There does not appear to be any powers vested in the Town Council by its incorporation act that would enable them to pass a by-law for the purpose aforesaid. "In case a by-law requires the assent of the rate-payers before the final passing thereof, the procedure for plebiscite is laid down in 5 George V. cap. 18 (passed in 1915). This gives in detail the procedure required to be followed including the form of the ballot. "In other words, it would appear from the above that the Town Council has no power to pass a by-law of this nature, therefore a plebiscite would have no effect even if the act of 1915 was followed. "In short, the Town having no power to pass the said by-law, therefore no plebiscite could be held under said act. "Trusting this answers your inquiry. "I remain "Yours very truly, "Ernest H.
