Cowley takes Big lead Over Apps

MONTRÉAL, Feb. 10 (CP)—A goal and three assists during the week widened the lead of Boston's Bill Cowley to eight points atop the National Hockey League scoring race.

Cowley ran his total to 43 points on 11 goals and 32 assists, for a clean-cut margin over Syd Apps of Toronto who picked up one assist during the week to bring his total to 35 on 16 goals and 19 assists.

Bryan Hextall of New York Rangers made the greatest advance among the leaders, jumping from fifth spot to third with two goals and three assists during the week. The five points brought his total to 37.

Sweeney Schriener of Toronto, tied with five others for fourth place in the point column, remaining as the league-leader in the goal-getting department with 18. Cowley's 32 assists gave him a wide margin among the league's top play-makers.

Jimmy Orlando, Detroit defenseman, remained in undisputed possession of the league's bad-man spot with 63 minutes in minor and major penalties in addition to one 10-minute misconduct.
