Capt. E. Kemp Had Interesting Visit To Old England

Capt. E. Kemp of this city has recently returned from a visit to relatives in England after an absence of 24 years.

In August last shortly after his retirement from the service of the Marine Department here, Capt. Kemp took passage on the S. S. "Canada" and arriving in England in record time. He was particularly struck during his visit to London by the erection of so many magnificent buildings since his visit a quarter of a century ago.

The grain and potato crops this year in England, says Capt. Kemp, have been good, the grain being short in straw, but full and abundant.

In London he was particularly struck with the statue of Edith Cavell, and with the beautiful cenotaph in Whitehall where daily the pavement at the base of the monument is covered with fresh flowers from innumerable nameless contributors.

Shipping trade is dull in England at present and there are many large ships tied up in London docks.

The public is getting heartily tired of supporting unemployed workmen, many of whom are no longer looking for work. Food and clothing prices are coming down with decreasing wages, and the country is gradually getting back to normal conditions.

Capt. Kemp had a most enjoyable trip and many friends and relatives for the first time in many years had the pleasure of seeing him again.

He returned to Charlottetown a few days ago, making passage in six days, seventeen hours, on the S. S. Megantic, the big Star liner, well known to many returned soldiers here.

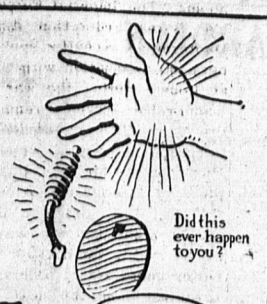

S.D.U. Defeat P.W.C. by Score 3-0

On Saturday afternoon at the C.A. Grounds St. Dunstan's University's soccer team in their initial appearance on the gridiron this fall defeated the P. W. C. College fifteen by a 3-0 score. The game was interesting at all stages and at many times exciting. During the first half the Prince of Wales men were completely outclassed but in the second they sprang a surprise and came back strong. Their efforts to score, however, proved fruitless as the Saints showed an ability to defend, which, although not altogether unexpected was surprising. The form displayed by the Saints was greatly superior to that of their opponents, the back field being well organized and the forwards playing an unusually good game. On the other hand the P.W.C. team was handicapped in this respect, as their half line was not all as well organized as it might be. Their forwards however played well in the open and in the scrim and it was due to their untiring efforts that all the P.W.C. gains were made.

The game was played on a partly muddy and slippery field and it was on this account that "Tom" Hines failed to go over for a touch in the second half after carrying the ball thirty yards only to slip and fall with a P.W.C. man on top of him. In the first half after playing a loose game for the first few minutes of play the Saints went through the P.W.C. half line with a load of "pep" that carried their opponents off their feet. They were stepped however on the Normal School five yard line but P. W. C. was strong enough to hold them nor push the ball and a few seconds later "Alec" McDonald went over for the only score of the game. Hines failed to convert and the ball was sent back to centre for the second kick-off.

In the first period the Saints employed an attack of considerable variety and deception, sprinkled with well conceived passes that proved successful to a high degree. The good work of McLellan, McDonald, Wedge and Gillis for the Saints and Nelson and McDonald for P.W.C. was particularly noticeable. It was in this period also that the P.W.C. backfield went to pieces when their plays would have perhaps proved disastrous for the Saints. But they were not equal to the occasion and so the pigskin was kept within the ten yard line of their territory almost two-thirds of the period. Gallant, a former Normal School man, showed up well in this half going around the P. W. C. end for several gains which helped materially in getting McDonald over for the touch. The first half ended with the ball on the Normal School's ten yard line.

In the second half the University came out well but their opponents had the advantage of the kick-off held the play in the Saints' territory for about three minutes. Here they had several perfect chances to go over for a touch but failed utterly. Gallant received the ball after a five-yard line scrimmage and sent it back to centre with a "liner" kick. For the balance of the game the Saints forced the game on P.W.C. ground. Hines, McPhee and Shea played well for the Saints in this half while the perfect passing of McLellan, McDonald and Monohan was a feature. "Phil" McDonald was easily the star of the P.W.C. line up and his mad rushes through the Saints centre for several large gains brought the P.W.C. rosters to their feet with a grand ovation for him. McDonald and Nelson also did good work for the Normal School in this period, and they too received their share of honors. But the big "huskies" of the Saints' rosters, who occupied a most prominent place in the grand stand were not to be outdone.

Time and again, when the Saints men ploughed their way through the P.W.C. defense, their old victory cry floated across the field uttered from the lusty throats of the Saints' followers led by "Thunder" Doyle. Towards the end of the game the P.W.C. half line was practically played out and it was only their staying power that kept the Saints from going over in this half. On the fumble of a side pass by one of the Saints' players the P.W.C. full-back captured the ball and sent it back to centre just as time was called. An exceptionally large crowd witnessed the game despite the fact that the weather was very biting.

Mr. Frank McDonald, the efficient referee proved most satisfactory in giving sound judgment.
