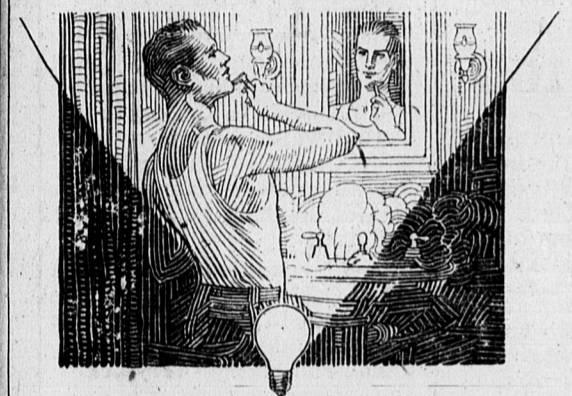

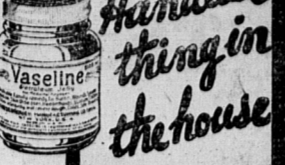

SANTA CLAUS BY AIRPLANE—While the expectations of the post office department that the air mail services on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence would be in operation by December 15, are not now likely to be realized, officials in Ottawa expressed the hope that all arrangements would be sufficiently advanced to enable a "Christmas mail" to be delivered to Anticosti and the Magdalen Islands.

U. Appleton, who is presiding. Matters pertaining to the railway are being discussed. Among those in attendance at the meeting, in addition to the Moncton officials are: F. W. Fitzmaurice, superintendent Halifax division; R. H. Marth, superintendent New Glasgow division and K. Stewart, assistant superintendent of the same division; P. E. Grady, superintendent Charlottetown division; R. Griffin, superintendent Edmundston division and W. A. Fitch, superintendent at Campbellton. Moncton Transcript.

HOTEL MEN TO MEET—A Dominion Hotel Association will be formed within the next month, if plans now under way are carried out successfully, according to Mr. Russell H. Davidson, manager of the New Learmont Hotel, Truro, and secretary of the Maritime Provinces Hotel Association. The object of forming a Dominion association is to secure, among other things, legislation that will put a stop to the losses that hotels now suffer from bad cheques. The Dominion Association was suggested by the Ontario Association which sent out a letter. Mr. Davidson's reply, speaking semi-officially, for the Maritime Association, was so favorable that the Dominion-wide meeting has been called. In the meantime the hotel men of the four western provinces organized a Western Association at Winnipeg, which it is expected will have delegates at Quebec next month. The Maritime Association was formed a little over a year ago.

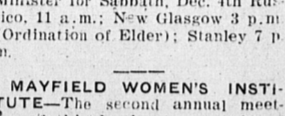

Treasure Hunt In Old Chateau

PARIS, December 7.—A story of a fabulous treasure, said to have been buried in an old chateau, is causing the inhabitants of Pont-a-Mousson to dig among the ruins of the centuries-old mansion. Two big iron coffers are said to contain gold, jewels and other valuables worth 40 million francs. (The present value of the treasure would be at least 200 million francs which nominally would be about 10 million dollars.)

As the story goes, the count had time, before dying, to scribble a will on a page of his Prayer Book. By this he left his fortune to the Church. He explained, on another page, that he had buried it all in the ruins of the old chateau and drew a plan of the place.

These documents were found quite recently when a man from Metz bought a number of old books at a public sale. Unfortunately, he destroyed a number of them—including the Prayer Book. But he read the other documents and so he consulted a retired lawyer of Metz who, after inquiring into the matter, offered to take charge of the researches in the ruins of the chateau.

He has so far spent 8,000 francs in excavations and he and his workmen are still busy with the chateau.
